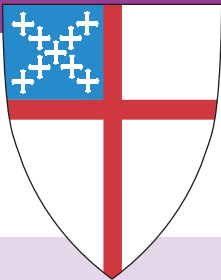

INTO THE LIGHT

There comes a moment in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist at the later service on Christmas Eve when the proclamation of the Incarnation has been made and the bread and the wine have been shared, the lights of the church are dimmed, and we see a small light of the flame of a candle in the darkened sanctuary. The flame is carried through the church, down each aisle, and from it a host of hand-held candles are lighted. The light spreads through the church,

reflected in the faces of our parish family, friends, and guests. In that candlelight we sing the familiar and beloved hymn, "Silent Night," a hymn superb in the simplicity of telling of the wonder of Christmas. The hymn was composed on December 24, 1818, by Franz Gruber, acting organist at Saint Nicholas Church in Oberndorf, Austria, as the breakdown of the church organ disrupted plans for the Christmas celebration. "Stille Nacht," composed for two voices, choir, and guitar and sung that night, might have been forgotten save that the man repairing the organ heard it and spread the hymn throughout the churches of the Tyrol. Sung first by candlelight in a mountain village in the midst of snowy Alpine peaks by farmers and villagers, it is sung now in the smallest churches and the greatest cathedrals. It speaks of a journey, our journey, from the noise and distractions of our daily lives to the gentle, age-old light of candles, the melody of a single guitar, and the joy-filled word of the birth of a most holy child, Our Lord, Jesus Christ.

Ted Peters Lecture



Episcopal College Ministries sponsored noted theologian and educator Ted F. 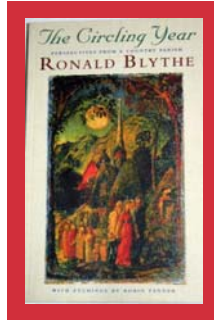

Come on an *adventure*, Ronald Blythe invites us; begin the circling year with *Advent*, a time both thrilling and solemn, exciting and risky. Blythe is a Church of England Reader, a widely-published writer and poet who lives with his cat in a cottage at Stour. And while devotees of the *Church Times* can read his weekly column, here is a thoughtful and inviting collection to serve as the year's companion.

He urges us to travel the Advent season with the same expectation of love and, yes, fear, that Mary and Joseph had as they traveled to Bethlehem. His reflections are a call

to think seriously about how we respond not as a whole church but individually to the new birth about

to come into our own world, our own selves. It will change us, he says; and it should. For this is a time when "God ventures toward us, we venture toward him." And so it is a time of waiting, but also a time of preparation and hope

There are thirty-five reflections in all, each based on readings for the church seasons. And scattered throughout are illustrations by Robin Tanner, whose etchings capture the dense vegetation of the English countryside illuminated with the light of hope. Altogether, *The Circling Year* is a small treasure.

Daughters of the King Celebrate 21 Years

The Saint Nino Chapter of the Daughters of the King (DOK) was formally commissioned at Christ Church, Valdosta, on July 14, 1987. Representatives of DOK chapters from other parishes in the Diocese of Georgia participated in the service as did the Diocesan DOK President. The original chapter consisted of 14 Daughters from the parish. The DOK serves Christ Church through a strong and faithful ministry of prayer.

The Christ Church Daughters of the King order currently has 29 members and meets twice a year. At the November 9, 2008, meeting the group elected Patricia Bezona as president and treasurer, Francis Guice as vice president, and Molly Greneker as secretary.

"Our sole purpose is prayer and what Fr. Peter would have us to do," said Pat Bezona. "We also follow the national guidelines and attend the diocesan meetings when held."

On the Web site: <http://www.dok-national.org/> the national



organization of the DOK publishes the following vision statement: Empowered by the Holy Spirit, our vision as Daughters of the King is to know Jesus Christ, to make Him known to others, and to become reflections of God's love throughout the world.

The Order of the Daughters of the King (DOK) is a spiritual sisterhood of women dedicated to a life of prayer, service, and evangelism. They have made a commitment to Jesus as Savior, and follow Him as Lord of their lives. They are an Order for women who are communicants of the Episcopal Church, churches in communion with it, or churches in the historic episcopate. Today the membership includes women in the Anglican, Episcopal, Lutheran (ELCA) and Roman Catholic churches.

The Daughters of the King describe themselves as an order, not an organization. An order is a community under a religious rule; especially one requiring members to take solemn vows. They don't just enroll as members and attend meetings; they take life-long vows to follow the Rule of Prayer and Rule of Service.

What is a rule? A rule is a prescribed guide for conduct or action by laws or regulations prescribed by

the founder of a religious order for observance by its members.

The Order of the Daughters of the King was founded in 1885 by Margaret J. Franklin at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in New York City. Members of the order undertake a Rule of Life, incorporating the Rule of Prayer and Service. By reaffirmation of the promises made at Baptism and Confirmation, a Daughter pledges herself to a life-long program of prayer, service, and evangelism, dedicated to the spread of Christ's Kingdom and the strengthening of the spiritual life of her parish.

The emblem of the Order is in the form of a modified Greek fleury cross inscribed in Latin, "Magnanimiter Crucem Sustine," the watchword of the Order, meaning "With heart, mind and spirit uphold and bear the cross." At the base of the cross are the letters "FHS", initials that stand for the Motto of the Order: "For His Sake".

A new DOK class will start in January at Christ Church, and all are welcome. Please contact one of the officers for information.

"Our parish is blessed by the dedication of the Daughters," said Fr. Peter Ingeman.

In villages and urban neighborhoods throughout Mexico youngsters gather each afternoon to reenact the holy family's quest for lodging in Bethlehem. The procession is headed by a diminutive Mary, often perched on a live burro, led by a equally tiny San José. They are followed by other children. The parade of Santos Peregrinos (Holy Pilgrims) stops three times but are turned away. They are offered the stable as shelter for the family.

Our version of Las Posadas can be anything you would like it to be...cookies and milk, a quick get-to-know you chat, a chance to teach your loved ones a different culture's tradition, a fiesta or a short visit. - Reviewed cleaning proposal from new vendor that could result in significant savings. Tabled until Junior Warden can clarify some of the contract items with the vendor.

- Received report of progress of renovations and furniture purchases for Louttit Hall. A handicap ramp is still being constructed.

- Received report that the Historical Preservation Society has approved the move of the Miller House. The house will be offered as a gift to a person who will have it moved.

- Received treasurer's report. The main church account has been moved to Park Avenue Bank. The finance committee met on September 25 to review records and procedures. The vestry

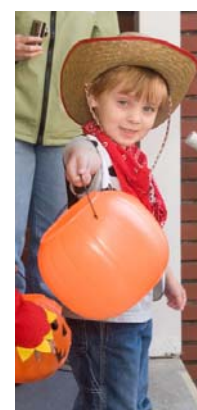
voted to continue the cash management procedures in place for the small amount of cash collected at services and functions.
