The Reverend Tar and Jim Drazdowski

Born and christened Edna Jean Cummings in Arlington, Virginia, to parents Joseph and Ellen Cummings, Tar Drazdowski is one-eighth Native American

Iroquois through her father's lineage. She was not raised in this culture, but knew at a young age that she wanted to be a part of this heritage. At the age of 12 she chose the name, "Morning Star." At a Girl Scout camp she wore a nametag that was damaged and after several days only had the last three letters remaining...tar. And that is how Tar got her first name.

After living in Falls Church, Virginia and graduating from high school in Gaithersburg, Maryland, she attended the

University of Maryland for two years. Working at a Girl Scout camp, she met a friend from Dixie, Ga. and came home with her for a visit. Together they visited Valdosta State College. Dr. Margaret Hiers, mother of Dr. John Hiers, convinced Tar to transfer and complete her degree in Special Education in Valdosta. Tar prayed that she would meet someone who loved God. The next day she met Jim Drazdowski at the VSC Student Union. Jim Drazdowski was born in New York City but moved to Hahira early in life. Jim and Tar married in 1977. And that is how Tar got her last name.

"I am an Episcopalian because I didn't have a car," said Tar. "As a college student living on campus, I wandered across the street. Jean Holland recruited me. That 12:30 p.m. service resonated with the message 'God Loves You,' and Jean brought soup and sandwiches to feed us afterward. What a place!"

Jim and Tar moved to Moultrie for Jim to take a teaching position and lived there for 17 years. They attended St. John's Episcopal Church even though the service was Rite 1 and much more conservative. They had three children while there: Andy, who now lives and works in construction in Boca Raton, Florida; Amanda, who is married to Matthew Harrell and is a teacher at J. L. Lomax Elementary School in Valdosta, and Amy Marie, who died in 1989 and according to Tar, "went ahead to be with Jesus."

Tar advanced earning masters degrees in Behavioral Disorders and in Counseling and Guidance. She has also done postgraduate work in marriage and family counseling. Employed by the Valdosta City School System, Tar is on

Vestry Report from December 15, 2008 Meeting

- Approved financial report.
 Cash flow continues to be
 healthy but negative month due
 to payment to Bargainier made
 during November.
- Accepted a 2009 budget of \$345,000 revenue. Pledges for 2009 were higher than in previous years resulting in a slightly positive projected bottom line. Final adjustments, however, will result in a balanced budget.
- Voted to ensure that the remaining \$6,500 in 2008 outreach budget is spent by year end. Authorized Peter, Tar, Stella, and Patricia to ensure the money is given to organizations that have needs in our community.
- Received an update on facilities planning from Jim Bargainier who presented a second drawing of proposed renovations and expansions of our campus. Voted to



Pepi Nelson, 2008 Senior Warden and Clint Beeland, 2008 Junior Warden appropriate \$20,000 for Bargainier to continue the next phase of the project.

- Received report from Sandra Fletcher, who is leading our fund-raising plans for the building project. A representative from our fundraising consultants, Community Development will speak at the January vestry meeting.
- The Rev. Tar Drazdowski has agreed to serve as Associate Rector on a part time basis beginning in September. The 2009 budget includes this addition.

From the Rector

A BEGINNING OF LENT

Throughout most of the month of February we observe the season of Epiphany. The season begins with the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6, the yearly observation of the revealing of Christ, the savior of the world to the gentiles as personified by the Three Wise Men or Magi. The season is a "green" season, a season of growth in our understanding of the person and the ministry of Jesus. The season of Epiphany ends on February 25, Ash Wednesday. On that day we enter the season of Lent, a season of self-



assessment. Preparatory to that assessment, on Shrove Tuesday, the day preceding Ash Wednesday, we are offered an opportunity to make private confession of those things that have separated us from God, our sins, and to receive absolution and forgiveness. With the assurance of that forgiveness, on Ash Wednesday, we come to receive the mark of ashes, the sign of the cross on our foreheads. It is the sign of our identity as Christians, the sign made in Holy Oil on our Baptism retraced in the ashes of humility and penitence. The ashes will fade; the sign is indelible. Such is the beginning of a Holy Lent. I invite you to observe the season of Lent, thus begun, with quiet reflection and dedication; some take upon themselves a discipline of fasting and giving up certain foods or activities, others take up special activities, all of which serve to mark the very special season. Perhaps these are things to consider in thoughtful prayer during these weeks of Epiphany. May God bless you.

duty Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. as a Behavior Intervention Specialist. She works with kids who have problems adjusting to school as well as with their parents and the court.

As a young adult Tar knew she was called by God to work for Him, but she wanted to raise her children first. She began the process to be a priest in 2000, graduating from Education For Ministry in 2004. She attended the summer program at the University of the South at Sewanee but transferred to the Native Ministry Consortium in Vancouver, Canada in order to continue part-time work on a Master of Divinity. She is still in the process of completing this degree. "In the process, I learned a lot about myself," she said. "Most people think linearly, but I discovered that I think in a circular pattern."

Tar has done her native study with the Cherokee tribe. They sent a delegation to drum at her ordination to the priesthood at Christ Episcopal Church in 2006.

"I enjoy pastoral work," said

Tar. "I think I have a calling for 'loving people through their problems." Many parishioners attest to her gift for comforting and genuine empathy.

In October 2008 Tar celebrated the first Saturday Night Eucharist at Christ Church. The service has doubled in

numbers since it began. Jim
Drazdowski regularly plays guitar
at the service. Dave and Stella
Clark coordinate the preparation
of the main dish while
parishioners bring side dishes and
desserts. "I always feel the
presence of the Spirit when I
celebrate," said Tar, "but it is
especially strong at that service."

Tar Drazdowski started the ministry to the Dominican Republic six years ago as a tribute to her friend Marsha Dutton Bates, who died of cancer. She took a group of Diocesan kids there on a mission trip and fell in love with

the place. The first year there was an American couple who acted as translators. The second year she met Miguelina Espinal, who later came to Christ Church, and they worked together to convince her bishop to let the mission team build a school and later a church at El Pedregal.

Tar was the Honey Creek 'Camp Mama' for

many years. Officially she was the Summer Camp Nurse but mostly administered first aid and motherly love.

Her favorite hymn is "The King of Love My Shepherd Is." She professes a love for contemporary Christian music.

Tar is also retiring from the school system in June after 30 years and will change her position at Christ Church from supply priest to Associate Rector at 2/3 time. Jim is also retiring in June from his longtime position as a math teacher in Cook County.

"My greatest joy in ministry is

loving God's people. The church is where you learn to live in community, you laugh, you cry and you raise your children," said Tar.


Nunn Elementary School.



The search for the 10th Bishop of Georgia is going well, albeit about 2 weeks behind our original schedule. Our guiding statement is "Discerning the One Mind for One Mission." Nominations required a postmark of January 15. After we have reviewed the nominations, the committee will conduct telephone interviews followed by interviews in person. The search committee received professional training on how to do an effective interview in January.

60th Anniversary of the Dedication of Christ Church at 1521 North Patterson Street, Valdosta, Georgia by Dr. Joseph Tomberlin

Thile reading the Christ Church archival material, Dr. Joseph Tomberlin, member of Christ Church since 1971 and former Professor of History at Valdosta State University, discovered that the cornerstone of our church was laid 60 years ago. The stone is the same one that had been in the former home of the church on Central Avenue. The stone was turned around, carved on the opposite side and used for our building. The service for the occasion is re-typed below. The articles deposited in the stone as a historical record are also listed below. The entire year from Sept. 2008 - Sept. 2009 is our 60th anniversary year. The first service was held in the new building on Feb. 20, 1949. The stone is located at the northwest corner of the property at College Ave. and Patterson St.

LAYING OF THE CORNERSTONE CHRIST CHURCH VALDOSTA, GEORGIA September 10, 1948

Cornerstone laid September 10, 1948 at 10 AM., Rev. Clifton White, Vicar- by Mr. Arthur W. Goodin, Treasurer, acting as Bishop's Deputy

Responsive Reading:

- 1. Thou art worthy, O Lord, to receive glory and honor and power.
- 2. For thou has created all things, and for thy pleasure they are, and were created.
- 3. Blessing, and honour, and glory, and power be unto him that sitteth upon the throne.

V: Beloved, we are assembled to found a house which is to be set apart to the honour and service of Almighty God, in the Name of Christ our Lord. Harken, therefore, and consider what our Saviour Christ saith of Himself: I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by me.

I am the Vine, ye are the branches: he that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit.

All: I believe. . .etc. (APOSTLES' CREED)

V: The Lord be with you. <u>All:</u> And with thy spirit.

V: Let us pray. (After this prayer all respond Amen.)

Here shall the Bishop or his Deputy name the articles to be deposited within the stone. The articles then within it, the Bishop or Deputy assisted by the Vestrymen of the Church and the builders shall lay the stone in its place. The Bishop or Deputy shall, striking the stone thrice with a trowel, say:

B: Except the Lord build the house their labour is but lost that build it.

<u>All:</u> Our help is in the Name of the Lord who hath made heaven and earth.

B:Blessed be the Name of the Lord, from this time forth forevermore. I lay the Cornerstone of a building to be named Christ Church and to be devoted to the service of Almighty God in Accordance with the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, that here true faith with the fear of God and brotherly love may forever flourish and abound: and that this place may be a House of Prayer for all time to come. Other foundation can no man lay than that is laid, which is Jesus Christ.

V: In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

All: Amen.

V: Let thy merciful kindness, O Lord, be upon us. <u>All:</u> Like as we do put our trust in thee.

V: Let us pray: (Here shall prayers be offered, to each of which as to the Blessing following, all shall respond Amen.)

The Blessing: Unto God's gracious mercy and protection we commit you. The Lord bless you and keep you. The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious unto you. The Lord lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace both now and evermore. Amen.



The Church Bookshelf

By James Huntington, OHC

The Work of Prayer (Sophia Institute Press, 2005)

This slender volume, written by the founder of the Order of the Holy Cross, a Benedictine monastic community, is subtitled "A Manual for those Who Would Pray Well." Its pages open the door to a prayerful Lent and the resurrection path beyond. But like prayer itself, the book may change our perspective. As creatures who inhabit two worlds at once—the physical and the spiritual—we should pray as naturally as we breathe. Yet to do so, says Huntington, we need to recognize prayer as a gift, moving us to desire whatever God has in store. So

rather than bending God to our will, prayer is a way of discerning the impulses that God has planted in us.

Reading Huntington is like sitting down with a soul friend who gently urges us to welcome the Holy Spirit into our busy lives. He reminds us of "acted prayer," doing our daily work well so as to please God. And he acknowledges that prayer is not always easy. "Be prepared for difficulties," he says

quietly. But his suggestions for daily prayer are simple and effective. To pray on awakening

I praise my God this day; I give myself to God this day; I ask God to help me this day.

is to begin the day with a reminder of whose we are.
