

The search committee has been blessed with an abundance of assistance from the Holy Spirit and we are all very thankful for that. Our committee continues to work well together toward "Discerning the One Mind for One Mission".

We were provided an impressive group of nominees (30 in total). We narrowed this list down to approximately 17 and completed phone interviews over the past several weeks. After completing the phone

# Tuesday Night Bible Study

Tilla Valencia began teaching Bible study classes in homes around Valdosta in 1987. Many of the classes have been interdenominational including Episcopalians, Methodists, Catholics, and Presbyterians. Twenty-two years later she is still teaching, currently on Tuesday nights from 7:30 to 8:30 at the home of Ron and Tammy Borders.

Dr. Valencia came to Valdosta in 1967 to teach English at Valdosta State College. After a 30-year career that included 12 years as Head of the English Department, she retired in 1996. During her career, she taught a class entitled, "The Bible as Literature."

At Christ Episcopal Church Dr. Valencia taught adult Sunday School classes on many themes over the years. She also preached homilies on many Sundays.

The Tuesday night Bible class focuses on books of the Bible. They are currently examining the letters

of Paul in the order they were written, not as printed in the Bible. Dr. Valencia often provides historical information that gives those who study with her some perspective on the culture of the time of the writings.

"We never put anyone on the spot," she said. "The class is open to anyone who is interested, and we all learn something to help us on our spiritual journeys."





# The Cloister Walk

(NY: Riverhead Books, 1996).

In this lyrical memoir, the poet and Benedictine oblate Kathleen Norris records her soul journey at St. John's Abbey, where she discovers, among a host of things, her joy in being grounded in the daily recitation of the psalms, as well as laughter and wisdom in the monks' stories. Best of all, welcomed by unconditional hospitality and participating in the Benedictine rhythm

of prayer, work, study, and rest, she rediscovers the spiritual life—in herself, in others, and in the broad expanse of her North Dakota home and her small Presbyterian church. This cloister walk is a pilgrimage

into the self, where she comes to a profound Trinitarian realization: loving God entails loving your neighbor; but loving your neighbor means loving yourself. Not easy, when you recognize your own shortcomings. But it is when grace transforms shortcomings into gifts that we, as she says, incarnate Christ himself, becoming for others his "eyes, mouth, hands, and feet" in the world.

Alleluia, Alleluia! Christ is Risen! He is risen indeed!




















# Softball Team Wins First Game

# Christ Church Looks Back

s noted in the April *Vineyard*, on November 19, 1948, Bishop Middleton Barnwell assured vestrymen that they should easily be able to borrow the money needed to complete the Parish Hall. Vicar Clifton White reported to the Vestry on December 12, 1948, that "Bishop Barnwell had in a telephone conversation with Mrs. White authorized us to go ahead with the loan," but that "no other details were available." The Vestry agreed that Senior Warden Jerome "Joe" Tillman would contact the Bishop immediately about the particulars of the proposed loan.

On the 19th, the Vestry met again to hear the results of Mr. Tillman's conversation with Bishop Barnwell. He outlined a plan to incorporate "the Vestry and its successors." Upon completion of the process the Bishop would "convey to the corporation title to the Church property, which could then be . . . [pledged] for the required loan." Mr. Tillman also read the application for incorporation drafted by his brother, Lamar Tillman, a local attorney. Before the session ended, two motions received approval. The first was to incorporate the Vestry and to ask the Bishop for written confirmation of his proposal to the Senior Warden. The second was to

Dear Mr. Macks:

The Valdosta church property stands in the name of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Georgia.

The Corporation yesterday passed a Resolution authorizing me as President to sign mortgage note and deed of debt to secure mortgage for the borrowing of \$15,000.

I have been to the Citizens and Southern Bank here and they are perfectly willing to let me have the money but would rather it be handled by the Valdosta branch if they care to do so. If they do not, I can secure the money for 4 ½% and if the Valdosta bank takes the loan they certainly ought not to charge us more than that.

I suggest that your vestry immediately take steps and become incorporated. Your officers can then sign notes to me as Bishop of the Diocese to be delivered upon receipt of the money. Whether the money comes from Valdosta or Savannah I will receive it and then turn it over to your vestry when you sign the notes to cover. If your vestry is incorporated then the officers of that Corporation can sign these notes to me without affecting their personal credit at the local bank.

With kind regards to Mrs. Macks and yourself, I remain

Yours truly, M.S. Barnwell

issue a work order to the contractor, Tinker Concrete, for immediate completion of the Parish Hall, on the assumption that incorporation would succeed and that "the necessary funds [would] be made available through mortgage."

The following day Clerk of the Vestry Robert G. Macks informed the Bishop by letter of the actions of the 19th. He wrote, "the proposal for incorporation of the Vestry of Christ Episcopal Church of Valdosta, with its attendant right to mortgage church property after conveyance by you, was passed unanimously." He also stated that he was relaying the Vestry's request for the Bishop's confirmation that once the Vestry was incorporated, the Church property would be "used as security for the necessary mortgage." Bishop Barnwell's response was his letter of January 4, 1949, that is reproduced with this article.
