he 2009 Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic was a huge success! We had anywhere from 150 to 325+ children during the four days of Vacation Bible School (VBS). Manual labor was not required this year, so we concentrated on the crafts for VBS in the morning and evening. We were truly blessed by our partners in the Dominican and by the children who tell us that we have a major impact on their lives. The differences that we make are largely educational. We provided 15 scholarships for the school in El Pedregal and three teachers' salaries. Clinton Beeland's company, CJB Industries, gave \$500 and another \$500 was given for books from the CJB Family Charitable Fund. Part of the fund's purpose is to provide books and education materials to underserved children and adults. Stefani Carroll purchased the books for us. We could not carry out our mission without the generosity of all of you. Christ Church has adopted this mission, and together in Christ we are making a

The motto of the Order of the Daughters of the King is very relevant to the needs of foster children in the Valdosta community. There are more foster children than available homes, and several local institutions including the Methodist Children's Home, Raintree Village, and Sheriff's Boys Ranch provide a place for these young people to live. The needs of these foster children are great, and several members of the Christ Church family together

with the Daughters of the King are working to understand these needs and "do something".

Through the generosity of the Vestry, Christ Church provided supper two nights during the annual life skills summer camp held for foster children who are close to turning 18 and being on their own. At that time we learned that the eight girls at the Methodist Children's Home did not have their own Bibles. Ann Burnette remedied this situation with a donation of Teen Study Bibles to the home. Academic preparation and success is important to achieving selfsufficiency and girls at both the Methodist Children's Home and Raintree Village need copies of their summer reading books to successfully complete that assignment. The young people in

these homes have all the ongoing needs that they would have in any family: school supplies, toiletries, clothes, books, and on and on. There are mentoring and tutoring opportunities as well. We will soon have a list of summer required reading for the girls at Raintree Village. Used books in good condition will be acceptable.



Flame in My Heart:
St. Aidan for
Today
(Morehouse, 1997).
By David Adam

From coal miner to

priest, and now retired as the Vicar of Holy Island, Lindisfarne: that is the far-ranging career of David Adam, who writes of St. Aidan as if he had been a close friend, transcribing his very words. Aidan, who left his monastery on Iona in the year 635 to help King Oswald of Northumbria bring Christianity to his pagan people, founded a diocese on the Isle of Lindisfarne. He became known for his patience and accessibility, preferring to walk through the kingdom, giving away a

splendid horse—Oswald's gift—to a beggar. Adam captures the ebb and flow of Aidan's life admirably, following each chapter with thoughtful questions and suggestions for mediation.

Leave me alone with God as much as may be.

As the tide draws the waters close in upon the shore,
Make me an island, set apart,

June 20, 2009; 10:26 p.m.

Liz and Andrew just made it in. While we were at the Miami Airport, Tar received a call from Liz saying they were running late because their flight was cancelled. They had to be rescheduled through Orlando and then Miami, so their flight into Santiago wouldn't arrive until 8:30 p.m. Our flight departed at 11:15 a.m. from Miami and arrived in Santiago between 1:15 and 1:30 p.m. We were met by Fr. Vincente and Pablo. We loaded our luggage and arrived at the camp just a little before 4 p.m. Thomasina and Anna Marie had snacks of crackers, ham and cheese and some potato chips and cheese puffs for us. Most of the rest of the afternoon was spent sorting supplies and getting things ready for Bible school. We should finish the rest of the things tomorrow.





June 25, 2009; 9:40 p.m.

This morning, after Morning Prayer and breakfast, the three pools were started being filled up. I painted the base of the planter around the cross. At 2 p.m. the gates were opened and the children were marched in by groups of 10. By the time the splash party was over, we estimated between 300 and 400 children were there. As the children left through the gate, they were given a hot dog, juice in a cup, a popsicle push up and either a package containing soap or toothbrush and toothpaste. Since the soap came in boxes of 100 and the toothbrushes in boxes of 144, and we gave out over a box of each, I know we had over 300, but Fr. Vincente thinks we had over 400. We all relaxed the rest of the afternoon and after supper some read and some of us played spoons. Things seemed to go well today and everyone seemed pleased with it.





Georgia Deputies Attend General Convention of the Episcopal Church

Christ Church's Molly Greneker served as a deputy from Georgia attending the General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Anaheim, California from July 7 through 17.

Molly described the opening eucharist as the event that set the tone for the convention. Presiding Bishop Katharine Jefferts Schori delivered the homily. "She described us as the body of Christ," said Molly, "and challenged us to hear the heartbeat of the church in mission...mission as she moved away from the microphone." It was a very powerful moment.

"Bishop Louttit is always such a calm leader," Molly said. "He sees issues from a loving pastoral viewpoint. He did not try to sway our votes, but rather explained the issues and ramifications."

The Convention is made up of two houses: the House of Bishops, and the House of Deputies. Bonnie Anderson from Michigan is president of the House of Deputies. The Georgia deputation consisted of four clergy and four lay representatives, and two alternates.

From her experience at the convention Molly thinks that the Episcopal Church USA is well focused in the great commission. "We are challenged to reach out beyond ourselves to do the mission Christ set before us," she said. "In spite of our differing views, we can still link arms and be united in order to accomplish this mission. The Millennium Development Goals provide a good framework that establish this mission."

Molly was a member of the

legislative committee on World Missions. They studied 43 resolutions during their work. Over the 10 days, 361 items of legislation came before both houses. The deputies worked from 7:30 a.m. until past 9 p.m. every night.

"Despite what the media publicized, the group was much less tense than in 2006," said Molly. "The Episcopal Church USA genuinely considers itself part of the Anglican communion."

Sixth Nominee Added to list of Candidates for Bishop of Georgia



Christ Church Looks Back

¬his month's history feature turns from the sublime story of the Vestry's struggle to find money to finance construction of the Parish Hall and to repay the loan. For August only, the subject is termites, the most serious physical threat to the new Christ Church in its earlier days. Obviously, the church structures were not treated against such pests when built in 1948-1949. On May 7, 1950, less than fifteen months after the first service on Patterson Street, the Vicar, Fr. White, summarized for Vestry "the termite situation, in the church as a whole." Vestry, however, took no action pending a report from Orkin Exterminating.

Orkin's statement showed widespread infestation that was heaviest around the door to the original kitchen in what is now the south wing of the sanctuary. Orkin proposed to treat the entire church plant and to repair damages for \$405.00, less a 10 percent discount offered to all churches. Vestry did

not accept the Orkin offer, presumably because of lack of money.

On December 3, 1950, vestrymen learned that "termites were again being seen around the Church." Their only decision was to contact "Jack Smart to . . . secure his services in making a careful examination of roof rafters and joists for any possible termite damage." By its January 1951 meeting Vestry had heard nothing from Smart. Consequently, Mr. Dawson introduced a Mooney Exterminating bid to treat the Church complex for \$250.00. Mr. James Carroll offered to inspect rafters and joists on the following Saturday with Mr. Dawson's assistance. They reported to Vestry in February that they saw

no evidence of termites in the upper reaches of either Church or Parish Hall. Also, a motion was offered, passed, and then tabled "until such time as necessary funds are available, that, at a future date, the offer of R.S. Mooney . . . be accepted, for necessary termite protection work at \$250.00."

In May the Vicar confirmed to Vestry that termites were still present, saying that the time for action had come. A Vestry committee of Mr. Carroll, Mr. Dawson, and Mr. Fry was

empowered "to get the job done, thru Mooney . . . if possible at about \$250.00." But in July the situation was still under discussion owing to confusion about whether Mooney's bid covered repairs and treatment. Mr. Carroll proposed to eliminate the confusion by having Mooney attend the August meeting to explain his offer. Mr. Mooney was present in August and stated that he would eradicate the termites for \$250.00 and offer continuing coverage for five years at \$20.00 a year. Repairs, estimated at \$75.00, were additional. Vestry authorized Secretary Robert Macks to sign an agreement with Mooney. The actual contract put repairs, including replacement of four doors, at \$141.21, plus \$250.00 for treatment. Thus the full process cost \$26.71 more than what Orkin had proposed fourteen months earlier, and the Vestry heard in September that the treatment and repairs had been accomplished and that Mr. Mooney had been paid.

The Stitchers of Love knit, crochet, sew, and create gifts for friends, themselves, relatives, and people they don't know just for the sheer joy of it. The group began around 2004 when several members of Christ Church got together with Deacon Patricia Marks in her home. Juanita Quinn, reportedly the most prolific knitter, named the group.

The group now meets every other Sunday in the church library at 4 p.m. It is a most congenial group, and they are all delighted when someone new wants to join them. Someone usually brings a food treat, and they share news of yarn sales. They offer to teach anyone who is interested. Julie Van Ham, the fastest knitter, has taught more than 40 people to knit.

That explains the Stitchers part of their name. The Love part comes from their amazing generosity. For the past month they have been knitting squares and rectangles which Patricia will block and assemble into a lapaghan, an afghan for your lap. This particular project, like all their projects, will be blessed on the Christ Church altar. The group made the lapaghan for a friend of Patricia's who is going through the diaconate process while struggling with health problems. The group made baby blankets for the Hurricane Katrina victims. They also dressed teddy bears in scarves and hats for the Victims Assist group of the Georgia Highway Patrol who give them to children involved in auto accidents. They have made preemie baby caps and blankets for infants in the hospital and scarves for women in the nursing homes. They have also knitted prayer shawls for parishioners.

The members are very grateful to those who have donated yarn and other craft items to the group. Asked why they knit, each had a different answer, but they all agreed that they enjoyed it and liked being able to give a gift they had made with their own hands.
