From the Rector





Georgia who is, I pray, enjoying every moment of every day midst the garden in which he delights. I met him long before he became Bishop, long before I became a priest. It was at Honey Creek at a meeting of the Commission on Ministry and Standing Committee. I was at the time an active duty Army officer trying to express a sense of call to ordained ministry, all of which was truly, a new world to me. It was one of those days. The people with whom I was to meet were all strangers. I was not given a schedule as to when I should appear. It was raining and gray, a January day. So I went to my room and, sensibly, took a nap, awaking in time for dinner. I was appalled that I had missed the meeting until I noted some concern on their part; they had forgotten all about me. Then, that evening at a social gathering, perhaps to atone for their lack of attention, I was bombarded with questions on topics of which I knew little or nothing. Enter Henry Louttit, my rescuer. Having received one perfectly incomprehensible question, I was examining my shoe tops and praying for invisibility when he stepped in and absorbed the attention. I am quite sure that even then he sensed a call beneath all my not very articulate responses. I think that we might call that compassion, and compassion has been, I think, the very essence of his ministry as priest and bishop. Such is the diocese he leaves to his successor, our new Bishop Benhase; such is the diocese he leaves to us all.







The Shattering Sound of Amazing Grace: Disquieting tales from St. John's Gospel. By David J. Schlafer. Cowley, 2006.



To consider what grace *really* entails, David Schlafer suggests, we'll need courage--like Mary, who

anoints Jesus's feet, and Nicodemus, who helps lay Jesus in the tomb. As we follow the author in a dance of faith through the words of "Amazing Grace," we meet familiar faces, from the wedding guests at Cana to Lazarus himself. But an influx of grace in their lives—and ours—is not necessarily a "live happily ever after" scenario; rather, it is an open door to a profound change in perception. "Stories of Amazing Grace are Tales of

Holy Terror," Schlafer suggests, playing on C.S. Lewis's intriguing line, "Every idea we form of God, God must, in

mercy, shatter." Only through that mixture of safety and risk may we really be born anew; and only that mixture is what makes any adventure—life itself—worth living. Originally a series of talks, Schlafer's slender book is thoughtful reading for Lent, when we prepare for "the shattering, shimmering joy" of God's Amazing Grace.

What is a Funeral?

Using the word funeral generically, we note in the last quarter century or so the development of a wide range of ways folks mark the end of the lives of loved ones. The modern 'funeral home' now plays a major role in most but not all funerals. Burial practices reflect varying beliefs about the state of the dead, from evangelical "no prayers for the dead" to medieval Masses for their release from purgatory and all shades between.

"The Burial of the Dead" from our Prayer Book (p. 469-500) is the norm for Episcopalians. This may (and should for the faithful) include the Eucharist. What to call it? The word Requiem is not part of our liturgy; perhaps Burial Eucharist or Mass of the Resurrection. If not pre-arranged by the deceased, music and Scripture readings are choices for the family to make. Then there are committal rites to be used at the gravesite (p. 501-505). Graveside rites alone are common, especially with non-liturgical churches.

Memorial services increasingly are frequent, particularly for non-Christians. The event may be held in a church building or secular venue long after private burial. Many memorial services have no religious overtones. Increasingly, family participation in burial rites is popular, oftentimes including humor and mementos of the deceased.

Cremation now is a more commonly accepted practice. Therefore there is the decision of whether the funeral is held before or after cremation. Disposition of the ashes may take place at the service, or at a later time. Also in some communities, "Home Funerals" are being resumed after a lapse of two centuries.

Given the options, planning ahead of time is prudent, and written instructions are helpful. Christian burial reflects the belief that the occasion is an Easter celebration of the journey to God for one of His saints.

Christ Church Looks Back

Readers should recall that the September 2009 issue of The Vineyard launched a series of articles that went on in the following three issues and described efforts by Christ Church's Vestry to acquire a loan from the American Church **Building Fund Commission for** construction of Sunday School rooms. As the continuing narrative related, Bishop Middleton S. Barnwell encouraged the Vestry to approach the A.C.B.F.C. about a loan, wrote a letter to the Commission endorsing Christ Church's loan request, and signed the formal loan application to indicate his approval. Nevertheless, when A.C.B.F.C. approved the application, according to Vestry Clerk Robert G. Macks, Bishop Barnwell "did not look with any particular favor on our desire to effect a loan through [A.C.B.F.C.] . . . and felt we should strengthen our financial position before attempting any further expansion. Why did the Bishop change his mind? Finding an answer nearly sixty years later is very difficult, but part of the explanation lies in certain aspects of the relationship of the Vicar, Fr. Clifton White, with members of Christ Church's Vestry and with Bishop Barnwell.

Clifton Huntington White and Dorothy White arrived in Valdosta in the fall of 1941, and he began teaching at Georgia State Woman's College, now Valdosta State University. Their names appear in the Parish Register in 1941, but their actual transfer of membership from the Cathedral of St. Philip's in Atlanta did not occur until September 26, 1942. At the time, Raimundo de Orès, Dean of the Cathedral, wrote to the then Vicar, Thomas G. Mundy: "Although Clifton and Dorothy White have been gone for over a year I still miss them dreadfully. They both did excellent work in the Cathedral – they are dependable and capable of leadership. I hope you are using them to their fullest capacity and enjoying them as much as we did at the Cathedral." Mr. White quickly became involved at Christ Church, and his name first appeared in the Minutes as a vestryman and acting Clerk of Vestry in 1942.

The parish records provide no traces whatever of Mr. White's subsequent training for the priesthood while still teaching full time at G.S.W.C. What is certain is that the Vestry, in its session of March 4, 1945, recommended him for ordination in the diaconate, and all vestrymen signed the recommendation form. The Vestry also "instructed" Fr. Mundy to purchase a surplice and a stole for Mr. White at the cost of forty dollars. White was then ordained as transitional deacon on April 29, 1945, and as priest on March 16, 1946. On June 26, 1946, he officially succeeded Fr. Mundy as the Vicar of Christ Church, according to the Parish Register.

The details of this sudden transition are almost completely lost in the mists and shadows of history. The Vestry Minutes of April 26, 1946, still show Thomas G. Mundy as the Vicar. The Minutes of a called Vestry meeting on June 24, 1946, two days before the succession was official, already refer to Fr. White as Vicar. No explanation exists of Fr. Mundy's resignation or removal, whichever it was, and, inexplicably, no Minutes exist for the May 1946 Vestry meeting. However, there are two relevant clues, one before the fact and one after the fact.

The first item speaks to tension between Fr. Mundy and the Vestry as early as the fall of 1942. An entry in the Vestry Minutes of October 18, 1942, states, "A motion regarding symbolism in the Church was not seconded or acted upon, as it was ruled out of order by the Vicar, inasmuch as service order is the business of the priest and not the Vestry." The second is in a letter from Fr. White to the Vestry, dated July 13, 1952, in which he makes unmistakable his attitude toward an unofficial meeting or "caucus" of vestrymen that occurred after the adjournment of the July 1952 Vestry meeting and to which White was not invited. He wrote, "I can recall another "caucus" some years ago which led to the removal of your then Vicar; some of you remember it also. . . . " The only vicar to leave Christ Church in Fr. White's time was Fr. Mundy, so his reference was unquestionably to Mundy.

An Educational Program for Preventing Child Sexual Abuse by Phyllis Hiers

A group of twenty Sunday School, preschool and PMO teachers, parents and EYC leaders met on Saturday, January 10th, for a workshop called Safeguarding God's Children. This training workshop, developed by the national offices of the Episcopal Church and required by the diocese of all those who work with the children of our parish, looks at the signs of child abuse, identifies inappropriate behavior, how to deal with suspected abuse, and ways the church community can work to keep our children safe. Beth Baker, Christ Church's Youth Director, and Caitlyn Kern, PMO Director, led the workshop, which consisted of two well thought-out informational videos that presented facts and dispelled myths about child abuse. It was followed by excellent discussion from the leaders and participants. The participants received a certificate of attendance. A future adult Sunday School class will give parents who missed this workshop an opportunity to see the video.
