Our Bishop Agrees to Retirement Extension

Blessing of the Animals Sunday, October 3



CONNECTING THE MISSIONS

In the early morning hours of Friday, October 1, 2010, Pedro Peralta Romero, a young man from the village of El Pedregal in the Dominican Republic, boarded a bus for the four-hour ride to the capital city of Santo Domingo. He carried with him a bundle of knitted items that had been made by a group of women in El Pedregal, including his mother, Tomasina Romera de Peralta, one of the cooks at the Episcopal camp, church and school located in El Pedregal and operated by the Diocese of the Dominican Republic. Once in Santo Domingo, he made his way to the Diocesan House.

Also at the Diocesan House that day were five members of a mission team from St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Savannah, Georgia, who had been in the Dominican Republic since September 27th, teaching Episcopal seminarians the techniques of singing the Mass and working in a nursing home operated by the Diocese. They had also been looking for locally-made craft items that they could buy for re-sale in the St. Paul's bookstore once they returned to Savannah and then use any profits to support other craft workers in the Dominican Republic.

Upon hearing of this interest, a diocesan staff member made contact with the local knitters in El Pedregal.

These knitters had been working for several months on scarves, shawls, and hats using yarn donated in June, 2010, by members of another mission team led by The Rev. Tar Drazdowski. Christ Episcopal Church had been sponsoring mission work in El Pedregal for the past 8 years, and the 2010 trip was the ninth such visit to this community. Over the years, this team had conducted Bible School for the children of the village as well as had helped with the construction of a combined church and school building, other buildings and grounds improvements in the camp, and individual homes in El Pedregal. Several years ago, Juanita Quinn, one of the team members, had her knitting along with her on the trip, and that sparked an interest in knitting among the women in the community. In addition to construction and Bible School, knitting became the third activity of this team, and in 2010 over 60 women, including several teenagers, eagerly participated in three days of knitting classes using yarn donated for this purpose. Most of the donated yarn came from Episcopalians in Valdosta, but other donations came from fellow church members in other places such as Savannah, Georgia, and Dothan, Alabama. The knitting class projects included knitted purses and small decorative flowers that could be attached to a purse, hat, or hair clip. By the end of the classes, women could be seen knitting with donated

needles and yarn on porches all throughout the community, guided by laminated instruction sheets that the mission team had translated into Spanish. All of the yarn left over from the classes was donated to the knitters who worked at the camp, including Tomasina, Pedro's mother.

On that Friday morning, the St. Paul's mission team met with Pedro and with The Rev. Deacon Bob Snow and his wife, Ellen, who had been serving as Episcopal missionaries in the Dominican Republic for many years and who coordinated the work of the mission teams from the United States. Ellen related the story of the history of the El Pedregal knitting project to the St. Paul's missioners, who then decided to buy all of the knitted goods and take them back to Savannah for sale.

After his delivery was completed, Pedro returned to the bus station in Santo Domingo for the four-hour ride back to El Pedregal to deliver the proceeds of the sale to his mother and to the other knitters in El Pedregal. The knitted items were transported to the United States by the St. Paul's mission team, and have been added to the stock of items for sale at the St. Paul's bookstore in Savannah. On some of the items, small knitted flowers may be seen.

One Book, One Diocese

A 40-Day Journey with Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Those who wish to journey through Lent together as the Diocese of Georgia may join in a diocesan-wide time of reflection. Every congregation in the Diocese is requested to announce to parishioners that we will follow cities and universities that have all gotten on the same page through reading the same book at the same time. The book is 40-Day Journey with Dietrich Bonhoeffer, edited by Ron Klug.

In Lent, we will use the diocesan website to not only allow Bishop Benhase to share his thoughts on using Bonhoeffer's writings as a Lenten guide, but will open up the floor to comments from around the Diocese. Each day, the book offers a short reading from the martyred German Theologian, together with a verse or verses of scripture, questions to ponder, a "Psalm fragment" to read, journaling suggestions and prayer. Each day, those who wish to share how the Holy Spirit


is using the readings and reflections in their hearts and minds may write something at the website. That could consist of reading and reflecting on this book or some other Bonhoeffer

Inuksuit: Silent Messengers of the Arctic.

By Norman Hallendy. Vancouver, Canada: 2001



Imagine a stark landscape, covered with snow that hides crevasses from the unwary, with water on one side and an expanse of land on the other. And dotting the landscape, figures of different shapes and sizes — stone balanced carefully on stone. These are inuksuit, made by the Inuits. In this fascinating account illustrated with evocative photos, Hallendy recounts his forty years of Arctic exploration. But more important than his impressive background, which includes a gold medal from the Royal Canadian Geographical Society, is his ever-deepening friendship

with the Inuits. That association nourishes his understanding of the stone figures, created before memory as warning signs or navigational aids marking the path of the caribou or the hunter, treacherous ledges or safe havens. Today they are used as commercial icons, and, controversially, as the logo for the 2010 Winter Olympics. Yet it is the time-worn inuksuit that hold real power. "This is the way," they say; "walk here when you are unsure. Follow me to food when you are hungry and shelter when you are weary. I am the path home." It is a universal message indeed.

watches over them, and that God knows how to fix their very bad days, too.



John Robertson Lectures by The Rev. Deacon Patricia Marks

"How do you speak of God in an age of Science?" "Are evolution and faith incompatible?" These were some of the thoughtful questions considered by Dr. John Robertson on Wednesday, Oct. 20, when over fifty VSU students, faculty, and Christ Church parishioners gathered to hear his talk. Dr. Robertson, Professor Emeritus of Religious Studies at McMaster University in Ontario, is a well-published religious philosopher much in demand as a speaker. In discussing the relationship between science and religion as conflict, independence, dialogue, or integration, he presented an insightful review of major thinkers on the subject, from Augustine to Whitehead, focusing as well on Darwin and the possibility of seeing God in the evolutionary process. The discussion continued Thursday evening at an informal gathering in the parish hall, when he led a lively discussion on the challenge of secular humanism to Christianity. Christ Church is grateful to Dr. Jim Hill, Professor Emeritus of Philosophy at VSU, for helping to coordinate the visit.

Christ Church Looks Back

Michael Joseph Kippenbrock, Vicar of Christ Church beginning on May 1, 1953, was a Texan, born in Austin on September 29, 1903. He was the eighth of nine children and the fifth of the six sons of Francis Lewis Kippenbrock and Josephine Bernardine Brown Kippenbrock.

Little historical information about Michael Kippenbrock, other than that relating to his stint at Christ Church, 1953-1963, is readily available. The first concrete item appears in the 1930 Federal Census, which shows him living with his first wife, Annabel Mae Coffman Kippenbrock, in Fairbanks, Alaska, where he was Vicar of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church. Annabel Mae Coffman was born on September 14, 1904, and she married Kippenbrock on June 7, 1928. Their first child, David Michael, was born in Fairbanks on December 27, 1931. The second, Anne Virginia, also was born in Fairbanks on February 3, 1935, and her mother died the same day.

Kippenbrock remarried on April 21, 1937, slightly more than two years after Annabel's death. His bride was Virginia Lee of Norfolk, Virginia, who was born on February 1, 1898. He apparently was a chaplain in the United States Army during World War II. Robert G. Macks, Clerk of Christ Church's Vestry and a retired Army officer, addressed him as "Padre" [a title often applied to military chaplains] in letters concerning his move from Saint Thaddeus Church, Aiken, South Carolina, to Christ Church. In *The Vineyard*, p. 10, November 2010

addition, Kippenbrock was an officer in the Army Reserve when he came to Valdosta, and one of his first requests to the Vestry in the meeting of July 5, 1953, was for vacation time between August 16th and 30th, 1953, "to attend Reserve Officers Camp" at Fort Gordon, Georgia. As noted, his position immediately before his move to Christ Church was Rector of Saint Thaddeus in Aiken, South Carolina, from May 23, 1949, until March 31, 1953.

Fr. Kippenbrock served at Christ Church until his departure on September 30, 1963. Volume III of the Christ Church Parish Register shows the same brief note next to his name and that of his wife: "Transferred to All Saints, Enterprise, Fla. 9/30/63." David Kippenbrock, then in the U.S. Army, already had transferred to Trinity Episcopal Church, Columbus, Georgia, on April 23, 1959, and Anne, who had married George William Tudor in 1959, transferred to All Saints, Enterprise, Florida, on June 23, 1965. When Kippenbrock died on February 24, 1973, he and his wife were residents of Orlando, Florida. He and Virginia, who died on December 23, 1974, in Norfolk, Virginia, were buried next to each other in Oakwood Cemetery, Norfolk.

During Fr. Kippenbrock's first Christ Church Vestry meeting on May 3, 1953, Senior Warden Jamie Carroll raised the possibility of selling the old "Rectory" at 115 West North Street as the first step toward acquiring new housing for the Vicar and his family. On an Omer Franklin motion, however, Vestry tabled the question until the June meeting. On June 7, 1953, the same action occurred again: "Possible sale of the Rectory tabled to the next meeting."

What also occurred in the same session was the Vestry's turning again to the idea of expanding the physical plant to provide new Sunday School rooms, which initiated significant discussion. As the Minutes relate, "The Vicar was kind enough to subordinate action on a new Rectory to the definite needs of the Sunday School." Some vestrymen stressed the urgent need for additional teaching spaces, but there were also calls for unanimity on the issue. The immediate decision was that Vestry Clerk Bob Macks approach the American Church Building Fund Commission anew about "securing in the immediate future a loan of \$7,000.00 on projected cost of approximately \$10,000.00." Other vestrymen were to "check on local financing."

Macks wrote Richard P. Kent, Jr., Secretary of the A.C.B.F.C., on June 8, 1953. He emphasized that Clifton White had been called to a church in Lakeland, Florida, that Christ Church "had been fortunate" to obtain "the services of the Rev. Michael I. Kippenbrock," and "happily that we have every indication of having a thoroughly united congregation supporting our new Vicar." Moreover, Christ Church now was debt free. As he said, "We do not owe any money." Then he got to the point, which was the Vestry's desire to borrow \$7,000.00 from A.C.B.F.C.: "Is there any possibility of early action through the Fund?"


Core Training Class for Godly Play
