Vestry Report from March 21, 2011

• Discussed the Facilities Committee report with emphasis on the construction decision of one building or two. Fr. Ingeman will send a letter to parishioners asking for opinions on the decision and requesting additional pledges. Those who have pledged will be asked to speed up payments so that the church will not have to borrow as much money.

- Discussed the amount of debt the church is comfortable carrying to pay for the new construction.
- Approved a motion to pursue the sale and removal of the Bray House from Christ Church property in anticipation of the construction of the new Education building.
- Reported the painting of the rectory will begin within a week. A storage building will be delivered to replace the rectory garage which will be torn down because of structural instability. Cracked and damaged sidewalk concrete around the church is under repair.

- Received reports on the Preschool, Parents' Morning Out, 2011 preregistration for Preschool, the Dominican Republic trip, the DR auction, as well as the Stitchers of Love project to make knitted bunnies for the children at the Haven and to make crocheted crosses for those at the Langdale House and Heritage House for Easter.
- Approved a motion to provide \$4,000 from the outreach budget for scholarships for students in Episcopal Dominican schools in the Dominican Republic.
- Encouraged all to sign up for the Christ Church team at Relay for Life scheduled for April 29 and announced the success of the youth car wash and pancake supper.

The capital campaign is at a critical juncture. The Vestry and Planning Committee must make a decision soon about whether to build the Parish Hall and Kitchen in addition to the Education Building so that construction can begin this summer. Only 50% of our members have pledged. Please consider pledging now. Every pledge counts. Many small pledges add up to large dollars. Help make this dream come true for our youth.





This year we are blessed to have 28 people ranging in age from 12 to over 65 participating in the June 18 - 25 mission trip to the Dominican Republic. Over half of those are

from Christ Church. This is the largest group in the 10year history of our work in Georgia's companion diocese.

The group will work to construct two houses, renovate a house into a daycare center, teach knitting to approximately 60 women in the village of El Pedregal, and assist the local Episcopal church with Vacation Bible School for over 120 children.

With the great generosity of the Christ Church parishioners, we hope to provide 25+ scholarships to the local Episcopal school we helped build in years past. Please donate items to the silent auction and bid on others. Large items like cars, a week's vacation in a beach or mountain house, dinners for 12+, and fishing trips add many dollars to support our efforts. All funds raised go to mission projects; the team members pay their own way.



Honey Creek Bonds

Sales continue of 10-year \$5,000 bonds with a target of \$2 million. Those purchasing a bond will receive two payments a year of \$125 each per bond, for \$250 a year in interest. As of April 19, \$80,000 in bonds have been sold.

The sale is for qualified investors in the State of Georgia only. Individuals can invest from their IRA accounts. Congregations of the Diocese of Georgia qualify to invest and several churches, including Christ Church, are working through

The Church Bookshelf

Sisters of Sinai: How two Lady Adventurers Discovered the Hidden Gospels. By Janet Soskice. Vintage, 2010.



Here is an adventure story! Agnes Smith Lewis and Margaret Smith Gibson, Scottish

twin sisters, journey in 1892 to St. Catherine's Monastery on the Sinai Peninsula after the deaths of their Cambridge scholar husbands. Having earlier explored Cairo, Jerusalem, and Cyprus, these indomitable women had only one complaint about journeying across the desert: the camel's gait interfered with their reading the Psalms in Hebrew as they traveled. Their goal was to examine a trove of uncatalogued Syriac manuscripts that they had heard of from Quaker scholar Rendel Harris. Agnes, already fluent in Greek and Arabic, taught herself Syriac (an Aramaic dialect). The sisters, welcomed by the monks, pitched their tent near "the well of Moses" and the "original burning bush." They made friends with the monastery's librarian, who entrusted them with a 7th

And then, Agnes, using her tea kettle to steam apart the parchment pages, finds a palimpsest — a manuscript with an earlier text overwritten by a later one. It is arguably the earliest Syriac text of the Gospels, parts dating from the 2nd century. The sisters photograph the pages and return to St. Catherine's with an entourage of scholars, where, perched at a rickety table outside their tent, they transcribe the text.

Despite ongoing scholarly squabbles, Agnes published almost a dozen transcriptions and catalogues. They received honorary degrees from Heidelberg, Dublin, and St. Andrews (Cambridge did not award degrees to women until 1921). Soskice, who has a deft hand for description, writes a fascinating book about two intrepid women who, against all odds, make a remarkable discovery that changed our understanding of New Testament history.

Canterbury Club Hosts Dead Day

Once again Christ Church will offer a place for the VSU students to study and eat on May 3rd, "Dead Day," the day between the end of the semester and the beginning of finals. The Rev. Tar Drazdowski asks parishioners to sign up to provide dinner and snacks, with the house being open from 8 a.m. until 10 p.m. Eucharist will be celebrated at 7 p.m.

Sparky Greneker, the youngest member of the Christ Church Vestry and a VSU student, thanked the Vestry during the April meeting for this assistance. "With food and snacks available, Louttit Hall is the ideal place to study on this special day," he said.

Last semester 29 students came to the house sometime during the day. Tar+ said, "The students would like to have wireless Internet access there and we are working to provide that service. If you are interested in providing snacks or dinner, please call me at (229) 242-5115. We welcome students of all faiths to join our group. We would also like to thank the good people of Christ Church for their prayers, support, and especially the meals they have provided all year. They have been delicious, and they help define God's love for us!"



As noted at the end of "Christ Church Looks Back" in the April Vineyard, Vestry learned in the meeting of February 7, 1954, that the architect, Joe Bright, and the contractor, Bill Tullis, had requested payment for their work on the Sunday School Annex. The reaction was the passage of a Marion Tucker-Robert Macks motion that "payment only be made on acceptance of the premises by the architect and the Building Committee, substantiated by the consent of the Vestry as a whole." That action indicated only that the Vestry was displeased with the quality of construction on the part of Mr. Tullis and continued to be dissatisfied with him, as we shall see later.

Meanwhile, the processing of Christ Church's loan application by the American Church Building Fund Commission proceeded quickly. Omer Franklin, acting as Christ Church's agent and attorney, had mailed the relevant documents for the loan to Richard P. Kent, Secretary of the A.C.B.F.C., on January 27, 1954. On February 8, 1954, Kent sent a registered letter to Franklin that contained a check for \$9,000.00, the amount requested by Christ Church. The check was written to the order of "The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Georgia, Inc., and the Vestry of Christ Protestant Episcopal Church of Valdosta, Georgia, Inc."

Also enclosed were seven documents, some of which, such as the "Certificate of Value" and "Last Payment Certificate," were new and had to be *The Vineyard*, p. 10, May 2011

completed. To others Franklin had to make what Kent called "adjustments." For example, the "seal of the Vestry had to be affixed to the "Promissory Note," "if the Vestry has a seal." In the case of the "Loan Deed," one sentence had to be "stricken" from the document. And in the instance of the "Consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee," two blank spaces had to be "filled in." As Kent put it, "The words to be inserted are self evident."

On the final page of his threepage letter, Kent provided instructions to enable Franklin to complete the loan process. First, Franklin was to deliver the \$9,000.00 check to "the proper representatives of the Diocese of Georgia and Christ Church, Valdosta, upon completion of the foregoing adjustments and details...." Kent also reminded Franklin that he was to make certain "that the buildings and improvements on the mortgaged premises are insured for fire and extended coverage in conformity with the provisions in the loan deed."

Upon closing on the loan, Franklin was to return the various completed, corrected, or "adjusted" documents "together with insurance policy or policies bearing mortgage clause in our favor [that is, in favor of the A.C.B.F.C.]; and a continuation of your Certificate as Counsel relative to title and certifying that Loan Deed to us is the first lien of record." Kent also stated that the practice of the A.C.B.F.C. was to "compute interest from the date of closing. . . ." Therefore, he was to be informed of "the date in this case" as well as the name and address of the Treasurer of Christ Church, or other officer to whom statements and further communications should be addressed." Finally, he pointed out that the borrower, meaning Christ Church, was "expected to pay the recording fee and all incidental expenses."

By March 4, 1954, Franklin had completed the instructions provided by Kent and on that date mailed a letter to Noah E. Fry, Christ Church's Senior Warden. In the letter was the check from the A.C.B.F.C. for \$9,000.00. Bishop Barnwell already had endorsed it on behalf of the Diocese of Georgia, and all that remained was for Mr. Fry to endorse and deposit it. At the meeting of March 8, 1954, Franklin informed the Vestry of the "completion of details in reference to the mortgage on Christ Episcopal Church in Valdosta...." Vestry agreed to pay Franklin's firm for "expenses incurred;" and Mr. Fry passed the loan check to Treasurer Roy Newham for deposit. However, Vestry "affirmed that no payment was to be made to the contractor until he has lived up to his agreement." Apparently, Mr. Tullis eventually satisfied Vestry, as the Treasurer's Report of June 30, 1954, showed \$9,186.37 for "Major Improvements" among payments made in June.

The new Sunday School rooms were used from 1954 until a major renovation of Church and Parish Hall in 1980 and 1981. During that project, the "new kitchen," still in use, replaced the Sunday School rooms.
