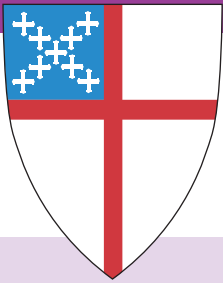

Independence Day



Have I told you about my cousin Bill? We grew up together. Many, many years ago we spent each summer together at my grandfather's summer cottage in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. It was paradise for little boys. There was a lake for fishing and a creek to be explored full of tadpoles and turtles and frogs. There was an attic filled with ancient National Geographics and Saturday Evening Posts for rainy days. There were huge, to us, shade trees for lazy, hot afternoons and July in Wisconsin can be very hot indeed. My cousin was, and is, an inventor. One summer he invented his own fireworks for the Fourth of July. He filled a brown paper bag with confetti and a long string of the little firecrackers called "ladyfingers," this being before such things were deemed dangerous. His plan was to wait until dusk on the Fourth while the adults were relaxing in lawn chairs, creep up behind them, light the firecrackers, hurl the bag over their heads, and look on as the explosion created a shower of confetti, all of which would elicit appreciative applause from our delighted parents and grandparents. This he did and it worked, far too well. It had been an exceptionally dry summer in Wisconsin. The explosion was impressive but the confetti, of course, caught fire, igniting hundreds of little fires all over the dry lawn. Adults were suddenly busy, running about stamping out fires. They were not amused. Bill vanished. Why tell this story? Well, we all have our moments of spiritual complacency, sitting in our own metaphoric lawn chairs thinking we have done it all. Those really are the moments when Jesus tosses a few fireworks into our lives to get us busy and active again doing what He has called us to do. The job is never really finished, but the doing can be very exciting. Have a great Independence Day.

2011 Mission Trip to the Dominican Republic

This year's Dominican Republic mission team of 30 was the largest group ever in our 10-year history, but very easy to manage because of their servants' hearts and cooperative spirits. We accomplished more separate construction tasks than ever with three crews: roofed two houses, excavated an electrical station site, tore down a 100-foot fence and dug the foundation to replace it, dropped ceilings in two bathrooms in a new dormitory, and installed three ceiling fans in the dining hall. Other team members worked at Vacation Bible School for approximately 125 children, knitting and crocheting classes for 75, where 25 were first-time knitters, and held a splash party for the children of the village. This team had talents we didn't know about before we gathered. There were also more Spanish speakers than we realized which enriched our experience tremendously.

Some of the traditions we started years ago, like the splash party, have been taken up by the teen workers at the camp to share with others who come to the camp. They use the pools and a large tarp we purchased years ago.

Father Carlos Santana held the graduation ceremony for the church school of the Mount of the Transfiguration on Wednesday afternoon on the lawn of the camp. The community of El Pedregal gathered for a dinner with the team in the dining hall on the Thursday evening before the team left. There was music and dancing. Father Carlos has plans for a day care center where nutritious food and fresh water is served to children from six weeks to four. The school now serves children from Pre-K through the eighth grade. He plans to split shift the classes when it becomes overcrowded. Our team left money for 27 scholarships to the school for the 2011-2012 school year.

Like those to whom Jesus spoke in Matthew 10:40-42, we went to the DR to offer a cup of water but we received a gallon in return. I want to thank all the people who supported us financially, materially, and spiritually, giving us the joy of seeing the children of Christ in the Dominican Republic. With all the wonderful things we accomplished, it is the ministry of presence that completes the relationship...One God, One Church, One Mission.

An icon of the Virgin Mary, written and donated to the Dominican Mission auction by

The Rev. Peter and Happy Ingeman, was purchased and donated to Christ Church.

The icon is of "Mary, Interceding" and was written in March and April of 2011. It is the seventh icon the Ingemans have written.

"We became very close to her," said Happy. "She seemed to emerge from the very gessoed board on which we worked."

Icons are written and not painted because of the prayer that is part of the creation. The Ingemans used egg tempera in the Russian Byzantine style like that of Vladimir Andreyev.

According to Fr. Ingeman, Mary is always depicted in blue. The starburst on her headscarf and robe indicate her position as the queen of heaven.

Fr. Ingeman blessed the icon at a Vespers service, and it presently stands on the side altar.

The Christ Church softball team began its season with 3 straight losses before winning its first game against Park Avenue Baptist Church. They then lost 1 game before winning their next game. After that they lost 6 more games before winning the final game of the season.

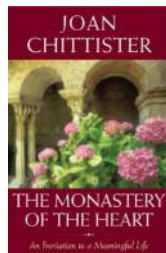
Unlike last year's team, which had a better overall record, this team played more complete games with only three games called because of the mercy rule, and none where in three innings. The mercy rule in softball is that if a team is winning by 20, 15, or 10 runs at the end of the 3rd, 4th, or 5th innings respectively, then the game is called.

This year's outstanding players include Paul Stevenson with the most singles, Stephen Sandbach with the most doubles, Houston Maples with the most triples. There were only two home runs hit this year, one by Bryan Deloach and one by William Wilkens. William was also the RBI leader with 19. Andy Boutwell was the Batting Average leader, but was unable to play all season because of a broken heel. Stephen Sandbach was the Batting Average leader for those players with over 15 at bats. The Monastery of the Heart: An Invitation to a Meaningful Life

By Joan Chittister. Bluebridge: 2011.

A gentle invitation to live a holy life, a good and happy life in the midst of our everyday activities: what a promise that holds. Joan Chittister's new book, a meditation on the spiritual path laid down 1,500 years ago by St. Benedict, calls readers from all walks to conversion of heart. As she weaves the Rule of Benedict into contemporary concerns, showing how the sacred makes the ordinary translucent, she welcomes us into a quiet, focused space in the midst of a world that clamors for attention. There is an online community for those who wish to pray with others or to learn about such practices as *lectio divina*, or sacred reading. For the contemplative, the layout of the text, centered in short lines, is itself a pathway, a call to slow down and make a commitment to Benedictine values — peace, care for creation and community, hospitality, prayer and study, and conversion of life. The monastery of the heart, open to all, is a sacred space where one moves from "one moment of prayer to the next,"

in the consciousness
that all of life is sacred and
that every act of ours
makes life either
more — or less — holy.

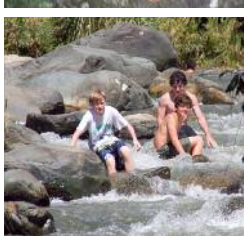

Two from Christ Church attend Province IV at Kanuga

The Rev. Tar Drazdowski and Mrs. Molly Stevenson, who were elected by the 2011 Diocesan Convention as deputies to the 2012 General Convention of the Episcopal Church, recently attended the Synod of Province IV at Kanuga Conferences, near Hendersonville, NC. Province IV, also known as the Province of Sewanee, is the largest of the Provinces in The Episcopal Church. Twenty dioceses in nine Southeastern states comprise Province IV, which is named for the School of Theology of the University of the South, located in Sewanee, Tenn. Included in the Province are dioceses located in Alabama, Georgia, Florida, Kentucky, North Carolina, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tennessee, and part of Louisiana. Province IV has the largest number of clergy, baptized members, communicants, church school and day school pupils and is the largest contributor to the General Convention budget of any Province in our Church. The 2011 Province IV Synod, held June 8-10, 2011, featured discussions on the proposed Anglican Covenant, the denominational health plan, immigration issues and provincial ministries. 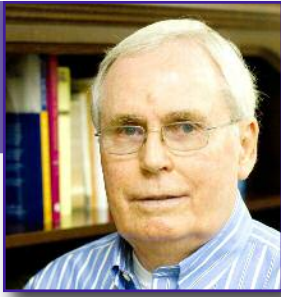

Christ Church Looks Back

In the congregational meeting of April 11, 1954, that focused on the "Articles of Association," James D. Carroll moved approval of the Vestry's application for parish status, and Courtney Ritsch seconded. Discussion of the motion apparently was brief; the Minutes note only one question. Irene R. Miller asked if Christ Church had achieved its budget goal for 1954. Mr. Carroll, chairman of the Every Member Canvass, replied that the goal had been \$13,000.00, and the church had received \$11,000.00 in pledges, compared with only \$7,500.00 in pledges in 1953. Harry Davis then called for a vote on the question, and the motion won unanimous approval.

Subsequently, Mr. Carroll, seconded by his wife, Frances Carroll, moved that the existing Vestry "be retained." Upon consent to that motion, Fr. Kippenbrock, read aloud the "Articles of Association," and members signed the document. Forty-eight signatures appear on the "Articles of Association" in Parish records, including one instance of a husband signing for himself and his spouse. There were two duplicate signatures, as two communicants signed the document two different times. The Parish records also contain a second copy of the Articles, with the names of signers printed at the bottom; here, the names of the husband and wife signers were separated, and duplicate signatures were deleted. Inexplicably, the last three signers of the "Articles," all vestrymen, disappeared from the

printed list. Then, following the signing process, on a Gillespie-Wanman motion, the members voted to adopt the "Articles." Finally, the Vicar announced that Vestry members were to sign the Oath of Office for Vestrymen before departing.

On April 27, 1954, the Vestry submitted a formal petition to the 132nd Annual Convention of the Diocese of Georgia, to meet on May 11, 1954, seeking the "admission of Christ Church, Valdosta, Lowndes County, into union with the Convention as a Parish. . . ." This document explained that Christ Church had asked the Bishop's permission to submit "this petition" and "to adopt articles of association" on March 8, 1954, and had received his assent on March 12, 1954. The congregational meeting on April 11, 1954, had agreed to Articles of Association. Minutes of that meeting and the Articles also were attached to the petition, as was a copy of Christ Church's 1954 budget. The petition's core was the fifth paragraph, which declared: *"in compliance with Article V of the Constitution of the Diocese of Georgia, we certify that the Wardens, Vestry and Congregation of Christ Church, Valdosta, do accede to the Constitution and Canons of this Church, are regularly organized by the election of two Wardens and ten vestrymen, and we do further certify that it is our belief that this Congregation shall be able to maintain the worship of the Church and to support a Rector. . . ."*

The Vestry, on May 3, 1954, assuming that parish status for

Christ Church would prevail at the Convention, chose Fr. Kippenbrock as the first Rector. On a motion by Junior Warden W.H. Sadler, seconded by William Gabard, the group approved a statement that, contingent upon parish status, the Vestry "call[ed] and invite[d] the Reverend Michael J. Kippenbrock to be the Rector of Christ Church , at a salary of \$4,800.00 per annum and the use of the Rectory. . . ." The call went to Fr. Kippenbrock by letter from Clerk Robert G. Macks on May 8, 1954, closing with the statement, "It is my sincere hope that we will all have many years of happy association in THE GOOD WORK."

Fr. Kippenbrock responded formally by letter on May 15, 1954. He reported that the Diocesan Convention on May 11th had "voted unanimously to approve the petition for admission as a Parish; the approval of the Bishop, at least the formal approval, is lacking since the Bishop is out of his office for the time being due to an operation." He believed, however, that Bishop Barnwell's "formal approval" would come as soon as he was "able to work again at his desk." As he said, if Barnwell had disapproved, "he would have made it known before this time." Fr. Kippenbrock closed with words that are as fresh now as in 1954: *"As a parish church, Christ Church now enters a new phase of its existence, more responsible than ever for a continuing and effective witness for the truth of the Christian religion. As we work together for the extension of the Kingdom of God, may the Lord bless us all and prosper our handiwork."*
