Dominican Development Group at Christ Church October 22-25

Thirteen members of the Dominican Development Group (DDG) will meet in Valdosta

October 22-25. The DDG is made up of one representative from each of the companion dioceses of the Dominican Republic and others who have a vital interest in the Dominican Episcopal Church. The DDG's purpose is to assist in the development and self-sustainability of the Dominican Episcopal Church. Over the past 12 years it has established a strong track record in this endeavor. In addition to regular business, the Board focused its efforts on strengthening the DR Endowment program, which has been vital during these times of declining financial support from the American Episcopal Church. Clergy and lay persons from the DR's companion dioceses, as well as are other interested persons, are represented on the Board.

The group meets twice a year. The interim meeting is always held in the United States, and the February meeting is held in conjunction with the DR Diocesan Convention. The Rev. Tar Drazdowski, who has represented the Diocese of Georgia for Bishop Benhase on the DDG this year, invited the group to Valdosta. Dominican Bishop Julio Holguín is scheduled to speak at Christ Church Valdosta on Sunday, October 23rd. Other representatives will be invited to speak at area churches, talking about ways to be involved in the Episcopal Church in the DR, much as Christ Church has been involved for the past decade in helping to construct and fund a church and school in El Pedregal.

"It is a special honor to host this important international group at our church," said the Rev. Tar. "I hope everyone has an opportunity to experience their charisma and passion for doing God's work."

In addition to the Rt. Rev. Julio Holguín, Bishop of the Diocese of the Dominican Republic, and the Rt. Rev. William Skilton, Assistant Bishop to the Dominican Republic, representatives from the Dioceses of the Dominican Republic, Central Gulf Coast, Eastern Michigan, Georgia, East Carolina, Northwest Texas, South Carolina, Southeast Florida, Southwest Florida, Western Louisiana and Western Michigan will also attend the meeting in Valdosta.

Gracias, Juanita!

Juanita Quinn, pictured above with The Rev. Tar Drazdowski, went to El Pedregal, Dominican Republic with the Christ Church mission team for five years from 2005 until 2009. During those years, she made worship booklets for the team and taught Vacation Bible School and knitting. The knitting project started small when one of the ladies from the camp saw Juanita knitting and asked if she would teach her how to do it. Of course she agreed, and more people joined the group. The next year Juanita brought yarn and needles for her knitters.

Juanita was diagnosed with multiple sclerosis in late 2009 and could not go to the DR with the 2010 team but sent worship booklets for the group. This year she made 40 needle cases and bought 20 more to send to her knitters who remember her fondly and ask about her as soon as the team members get off the bus.

To keep Juanita's knitting class going so that the women of El Pedregal will have an opportunity to make items to sell, Julia Ariail organized a team of six - Liz Welch, Jim Ellis Fisher, Grady Lacy, Sarah Gibbs, Marilynne Marshall, and herself - to teach the class.


Seventy-five women and young girls came to the class this year, the most ever. Twenty-five were first-time knitters. The class projects included a six-sided knitted baby block with each side knitted in a different pattern, a crocheted cross, seven washcloth patterns and plastic canvas stitched crosses and Cursillo roosters.

To thank Juanita for this unique ministry and for her continued contributions to the group, the knitters signed a "Gracias" frame with a photograph of Juanita and the needle cases taken by Julius Ariail at Christ Church before the team left. The young girl in the photograph holding the frame above right is Yamell Victoriano Canela, one of Juanita's first young students. Yamell assisted the knitting group this year and last year by helping the knitters understand the projects.



The Church Bookshelf

a review by Patricia Marks

The Motley Crew: Monastic Lives.
Brother Benet Tvedten. Collegeville, MN:
Liturgical Press, 2007.



Not exactly the title one might expect for a book about Benedictines and the establishment of the order, but Brother Benet, a monk at Blue Cloud Abbey, takes a refreshing look at figures from St. Basil to Dorothy Day. With full appreciation for the humanity of his subjects, he gives a glimpse into the day-to-day activities of the monastery (28 different jobs, not including those of the abbot, prior, and subprior), and, as he says, "it isn't the dwelling place of angels." But it is a community of dedicated observers of the Benedictine rule, ones who are willing to grow spiritually—after all, the Rule, which begins "Listen, my child," is for beginners. And that is, perhaps, most evident in the last chapter, "St. Benedict Speaks." There Brother Benet rephrases the Rule in four pages, speaking to all of us in our attempt to balance the holy and the human. Work and pray, aim for balance and moderation, he says; value learning, spread the Gospel, serve the needy, and honor other religious traditions. And above all, as we "Run while we have the light of life," we need serve one another in love.

Recent monthly articles in The Vineyard have dealt with the history of Christ Church in the early 1950's. Now, we turn back a few years to the forties to examine the circumstances in which the congregation decided to build a new church at 1521 North Patterson Street.

During World War II, when Christ Church was still on East Central Avenue, the Vestry launched an effort to prepare for possible expansion by purchasing a lot behind the church. Vestrymen discussed the matter in a meeting on February 23, 1943, and asked the Vicar, Fr. Thomas Mundy, to write a letter to the owner offering \$350.00 for the property. The owner was Emma Wiley Griffin Hardman of Commerce, Georgia; she was the widow of Lamartine Griffin Hardman, who had served two twoyear terms as Governor of Georgia between 1927 and 1931. She was a native of Valdosta and had been married to Hardman, who was twenty-six years older than she, from 1907 to 1937, when he died of heart failure at age eighty. The Hardman family also had owned a summer home south of Valdosta known as Alcyone Plantation.

Fr. Mundy dutifully wrote Mrs. Hardman and pointed out that her lot was of very limited value because it had no direct access to either Central Avenue or Hill Avenue. A copy of Fr. Mundy's letter is in the Vestry records, but Mrs. Hardman's response is missing. What is clear, however, is that she would not The Vineyard, p. 10, August 2011

consider less than \$500.00 for the lot. Consequently, Vestry held a called meeting to comply with Bishop Middleton Barnwell's instructions to reconsider the \$350.00 offer to Mrs. Hardman in light of her demand for \$500.00 and of Christ Church's pressing need for the land. Having debated the issue, vestrymen approved a Carroll-McEachern motion to pay Mrs. Hardman her \$500.00. Parish records do not indicate whether the sale actually was consummated, but one can infer that it was, because, after the War's end, Vestry revisited the question of expansion to make Sunday School space available.

On the first occasion, during a Vestry meeting on October 9, 1945, discussion about the need for Sunday School rooms led to a variety of "proposals about tents, cinder-block classrooms, etc." Vestry reached no conclusions at that point but agreed to continue talking about the topic and did so at the next meeting on October 30th. What occurred between the two dates in October is unknown, but the Minutes of the October 30th session declared, "cinder block construction proving ill-advised at this time, a proposal to investigate a new site for the Church itself was raised and tabled after discussion to be reconsidered after more data is [sic] available."

On November 25, 1945, Vestry took two significant actions, one of which was unrelated to the matter of a new location for Christ Church. First, having recommended on March 4, 1945, that Clifton H. White, a communicant, be ordained in the diaconate [and he was so ordained on April 29, 1945], vestrymen approved a motion that Deacon White be ordained priest and that their recommendation be sent to the Standing Committee of the Diocese. At the same time, they took up the possibility of buying from the J.F. Holmes family a lot directly across North Patterson Street from Georgia State Womans College at a price of \$6,000. A major aspect of the proposed purchase was that Christ Church would make a down payment of \$3,000.00, but there was no stipulation about a source for the remaining \$3,000.00. At the suggestion of James D. Carroll, the purchase in question was to be taken up initially with the property owners and then with Bishop Barnwell.

In the December 20, 1945, Vestry meeting, Senior Warden Abram Taylor Coppage read aloud both his letter to Bishop Barnwell about the desired acquisition of the Patterson Street lot from the Holmes family and the Bishop's response. Barnwell approved the purchase at \$6,000.00, including a down payment of \$3,000.00, and offered to sign notes for three annual payments of \$1,000.00 at 4 percent interest to complete the transaction. Horace Caldwell then offered a motion, seconded by Jamie Carroll, to carry out the process as the Bishop advised. But Mr. Caldwell also urged the Senior Warden to write Barnwell inquiring about "a commitment on the financial support which the Diocese would give toward the building of the Church."

Stay tuned; this story continues in the September Vineyard.
