An exciting time begins for Christ Church on September 25 as we break ground for our long-awaited education building during the Bishop's visitation. With a new nursery, new classrooms for Sunday School classes and Christ Episcopal Preschool, as

well as new spaces for our Middle School and High School EYC programs, this building will be the first "concrete" step in realizing our Master Plan.

On Monday, August 15 the Christ Church Vestry voted unanimously on a John Hiers/Steve Roberts motion to "begin construction on October 1 on the education building using the current total pledges and committing the church to no more than \$300,000 in long-term debt."



Please join us September 25 as we continue to "strengthen our stakes."

Three of the new kneelers are finished!

Received the altar rail of Christ Church in May. She stitched the shields for St. Stephen and St. Jude on a gold background of the 11.75" x 38.375" needlepoint canvas. The group of 10 who are working on the project decided from the beginning to duplicate the design of the existing kneelers as closely as possible. Fr. Ingeman chose the 12 apostles minus Judas, John the Baptist and the 4 evangelists as the saints to be represented. The group voted on the remaining 4 saints choosing Mary, Martha, Cecilia and Clare. The group received the canvas and yarn in November 2010. Frances worked as much as 8 hours a day at home, in the car while travelling, and on vacation finishing in just 6 months.

Frances has had lots of experience doing needlepoint. She did all the designs and three-fourths of the stitching on all seven of the kneelers for St John's and St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Albany, where she was a member before moving to Valdosta.

"I love doing this," said Frances about her needlepoint. "This is something I have to give to the church. I don't have much money, but this is part of my tithe."

Frances is now completing a second canvas. She took over Eloise Smith's canvas when Eloise became ill and asked for help after completing the shield sections.

Bill Nunn not only stitched one of the kneelers, he painted the designs on all 10 canvases before anyone began to stitch them. In order to paint the designs he reconfigured his art studio so that he would have space to accommodate all the canvas and yarn. He devised a simple numbering system and color-coding scheme to keep up with the yarn. When those who were stitching

needed extra yarn to complete their designs, he knew exactly which of the 6 yellow-gold colors they needed.

Bill described the project as, "a labor of love of God and church."

Gnann Moser stitched the kneeler with the symbols for St. Thomas and St. Matthias. As a school teacher at Valdosta High School and an adjunct professor at VSU, she had difficulty finding a time to come to the kneeler meetings. "I was the last one to begin stitching," she laughed. Beginning in January, she finished her kneeler the first week of August.

Jane Ferrell, Sally Nunn, Rita Hightower, Dot Chambers, Lavoe Houck, Frances Crawford, Gnann Moser and Julia Ariail are working on the remaining kneelers.

These heirlooms are truly remarkable gifts to our church. When the committee of 10 began to investigate creating the new kneelers, the Twiggs of Savannah, yarn store owner Alice Vantrease told us that another artist would charge \$350 each to paint the designs on the canvas and \$3,000 each to stitch the kneelers. Each canvas has over 80,000 stitches. The group set December 2011 as a goal for completing the project.

The Ball and the Cross

The Church Bookshelf

The Ball and the Cross by G. K. Chesterton



"A fine, uneven, annoying work," says one critic: sometimes it pays to look to the past for works that make you think. Chesterton's 1910

novel about the Ball (the world) and the Cross, figured in the shape that crowns the dome of St. Paul's Cathedral, is a fantasy novel with a serious thread—the clash between atheism and belief. The two sides are embodied in James Turnbull, a Scottish Lowlander who publishes an atheist newspaper, and Evan MacIan, a devout Scottish Highlander who smashes Turnbull's window because he believes Turnbull has blasphemed the Virgin Mary. No one—not the police, not the variety of characters they encounter as they flee across England—can understand why they wish to duel to the death over a religious question, an attitude that is Chesterton's condemnation of society's trivialization of serious beliefs. These fierce opponents argue tirelessly as they try to find a peaceful spot to duel, but eventually become fast friends. Oh yes, there's a "flying machine," an orthodox monk, and Lucifer himself, to say nothing of a frightening insane asylum where those who engage in thinking for themselves are locked up, including Michael (the monk), MacIan (suffering from religious belief), and Turnbull (diagnosed with Eleutheromania—the desire to be free). It all ends when Michael walks serenely out of the asylum, "singing as if he were alone in a wood in spring," through a corridor of flames. . . well, I'll let you read it for yourself. some length. Jamie Carroll offered to "investigate" the question of repairs possibly needed by both the "Rectory" and the proposed new rectory. The resolution, on a Jerome Tillman-Joseph Morrison motion, was to "forego further repairs to the present Rectory until decision has been made to keep [or sell] the present property." By the next meeting, less than two weeks later, the situation seemed to have changed for the worse. Senior Warden Abram T. Coppage reported to Vestry on September 13, 1946, that the Christian Scientists no longer appeared to have any interest in acquiring Christ Church on East Central Avenue.

Mr. Coppage, however, stated that "he thought he might receive a similar offer [to purchase old Christ Church] from Dr. C.O. Templeton. . . . He also said that "Dr. Templeton would probably want possession immediately after purchase." Further conversation led to a firm judgment that \$12,000 to \$13,000 was a fair asking price for the Christ Church property on East Central "without the pews or organ being sold." Further, the Vicar, Fr. White, pointed out that a temporary meeting place for the congregation of Christ Church "would have to be found suitable to the entire membership of the . . . church." He suggested that Georgia State Womans College, directly across North Patterson Street from the location of the new church, would be suitable, "subject to Bishop Barnwell's concurrence." A Horace Caldwell-Jamie Carroll motion to sell the East Central property at a minimum price of \$12,000.00 won

approval, but any action toward making the sale was tabled "until further data can be obtained."

Christ Church then held a congregational assembly on October 6, 1946. Vestrymen reported that the sale of the old Christ Church to Dr. C.O. Templeton had not been completed. If the sale were accomplished, Christ Church would make temporary use of an auditorium at Georgia State Womans College until completion of the new church and without any charge by the State of Georgia. Following that report, the meeting dealt with various aspects of raising money to pay for the new church. After the meeting, the fog of history descended upon Christ Church's work to construct and to pay for the present church on North Patterson Street. Parish records now contain no Vestry Minutes, no correspondence, no sources of any kind for the nearly eighteen-month period from October 6, 1946, until March 29, 1948.

Despite the lack of records, some facts are available about the time of silence from 1946 to 1948. Christ Church sold the old church to the Christian Scientists, not to Dr. C.O. Templeton, and for \$12,500.00. The Diocese of Georgia offered Christ Church \$25,000.00 toward the construction of the new church, provided that Christ Church could match the amount. The old church on East Central was deconsecrated in 1947, and an eminent Savannah architect, John Courtenay LeBey, designed the new Christ Church. BACK TO SUNDAY SCHOOL SPLASH BLAST

Our Sunday School year started off with a HUGE splash! Christ Church children were slippin' and slidin' their way down the Big Kahuna during the Sunday School hour on August 7th. It was a great way to start the new school year!
