Approximately 150 friends, relatives, business associates and parishioners participated in the service and the reception that followed in the Parish Hall. The Rev. Rick Buechner, The Rev. Tar Drazdowski, Dr. John Hiers, Mrs. Gail Hobgood and Mrs. Happy Ingeman served as presenters. Walter and Gail's children, Mr. Michael Hobgood, Mrs. Teresa Sage, and Mrs. Amber Teegardin vested their father with a new chasuble and stole during the ordination service. The Rev. Peter Ingeman was master of ceremonies and preached the sermon.

More than 50 of Walter's relatives came for the weekend to celebrate the occasion. A native of Innis, Louisiana, Walter came to Christ Church in 1998 and studied for the priesthood during several summer terms at the seminary at the University of the South in Sewanee, TN.

Walter owns Express Employment Professionals and has served as chairman of the Lowndes/Valdosta Chamber of Commerce in 2008. On the diocesan level

Vestry Report from August 22, 2011

- Reported the Bray House moved and Rectory yard re-sodded with sprinkler system installed.
- Displayed a set of plans from architects for new Education Building, discussed current pledges and cash on hand.
- Approved a motion to begin construction on the education building using the current total pledges and committing no more than \$300,000 in long-term debt.
- Suggested Bishop Benhase be invited to break ground after his combined visitation service on September 25 at 10 a.m.
- Discussed Diocese of Georgia asking for 2012 and agreed to make a decision at the September Vestry meeting.
- Moved the September Vestry meeting to Tuesday, September 20 so those with other commitments could attend and vote on the relevant issues.
- Announced Confirmation classes schedule for September 10 and 17; Walter Hobgood's ordination September 24 at 4 p.m.; and Bishop Scott Benhase's annual visitation for the next day. Bishop Benhase will meet with the vestry sometime during Saturday or Sunday.

Favorite Memory of Christ Church

Without a doubt, my favorite memory from growing up at Christ Church is All Saints Day. I don't know how it is now, but in the 80's and 90's All Saints was a big deal at Christ Church. Pews were adorned with the shields of the faithful; folks got to choose and wear a button representing their favorite saint; kids wore burger king crowns and dressed up ... all to teach and remind us of our own saintliness and interconnection with those who have gone before us. Not only did we celebrate the lives of the ancients, but we also remembered those whom we had lost at Christ Church. It was beautiful. To this day, I carry a rich and abiding sense of the great communion of saints all around me, and I owe that to Christ Church.

Favorite Memory of a Priest at Christ Church

I have many treasured memories of the priests who shaped

Christ Church over the years, but my favorite two memories are attached to two of Christ Church's deacons. First is Stella Clark, who always took time to kneel down and talk with us kids. She even had a little magic trick she would do when lighting the acolytes' torches before the procession. It brought a smile to our faces, and it's a trick I now use with my acolytes at St. Anne's. The second is Patricia Marks, though she wasn't a deacon at the time. As a young layreader, I was uncertain of how long to pause before saying, "The Word of the Lord." I asked this of Patricia one day as we lined up in the narthex. She responded with

respectability and decorum, "Oh, it's quite simple, Lonnie. When you have finished the reading, take a breath and say to yourself," at which point she dropped all propriety and said bouncingly, "One potato! Two potato! Three potato! Four!" Everyone around us dissolved into laughter, and this was the moment I discovered that serious church folk can also be seriously fun.

What's in the water in Valdosta that makes us special?





Life is So Good George Dawson and Richard Glaubman Random House: 2000



The subtitle says it all: "One Man's Extraordinary Journey through the 20th Century and How he Learned to Read at Age 98." Suppose someone knocked at your door and said, "I offer you the key to beautiful and thought-provoking spaces you never dreamed of. I offer you the fulfillment of your heart's desire." That is what happened to ninety-year-old George Dawson when a literacy volunteer came to his house. Here is the grandson of slaves, someone who worked hard all his life, someone who longed to read from the time he was a little boy. Supporting his brothers and sisters and then his wife and seven children came first, and so his love of school had to be postponed. Dawson, who became legendary for never missing a day of class, was studying for his GED when he died at 103. It is his life that is testimony not only to the difficult and dehumanizing experiences endured by many African-Americans, but also to the faith and joy that a compassionate, loving heart can experience in the midst of what most of us would see as deprivation.

John Courtenay LeBey, who shaped the plans for the new Christ Episcopal Church on North Patterson Street was described in his 2002 obituary as "one of Savannah's most distinguished architects." A Savannah native, born in 1905, he graduated from Savannah High School, and earned his architectural degree from Georgia Tech in 1928. LeBey spent the summer of 1927 in France where he studied at L'École des Beaux-Arts in Fontainbleau and received the institution's Diploma in Architecture. He was intensely involved in more than sixty building restoration projects in the Savannah Historic District. Among others, he designed the renovations of the Davenport House and the Waring House and guided thirty restoration projects for Mills B. Lane, Jr. LeBey was responsible for the design of the Georgia Salzburger Museum in Ebenezer, as well as the New Ebenezer Retreat Center. His personal Savannah residence for many years was the historic Cruger House at 4 West Taylor Street, a Greek Revival style structure built by Nicholas Cruger in 1852.

For Christ Church Valdosta, LeBey produced a design that, below the tower level, incorporated elements of Bruton Parish Church in Williamsburg, and he modeled the tower itself upon a seventeenth century design by Sir Christopher Wren. For designing the new church, he received \$2,000.00, which came from the \$25,000.00 that Bishop Middleton Barnwell pledged toward the project. However, he did not supervise the construction work; *The Vineyard*, p. 10, October 2011

that was instead in the hands of Lloyd Greer, one of Valdosta's best known architects of an earlier time. For his work, Mr. Greer was to receive a fee amounting to $1\frac{1}{2}$ percent of the project's total cost. As Vicar Clifton White reported to Vestry on April 4, 1948, Greer was "at present familiarizing himself with the plans and specifications and will invite bids in due time, calling for them the end of the first week in May [1948]." Vestry then held a called meeting on April 18, 1948, that focused on "final approval of the plans for the new church." Members of the Executive Board of the Women's Auxiliary also were present to discuss the possibility of increasing the kitchen's size from its original dimensions. Vestrymen granted approval to suggestions by the Vicar that would "enlarge the kitchen to about 15 [feet] x 18 [feet]."

The church ground breaking ceremony occurred on May 3, 1948, and was followed by a meeting of Fr. White and three vestrymen, Jerome Tillman, Noah E. Fry, and Robert G. Macks, with Bishop Barnwell to learn his "views . . . on several points." One issue was the bonding of the Christ Church's treasurer for a minimum of \$2,000.00, to which the Bishop agreed, with the provision that Vestry arrange the bonding and pay the \$5.00 annual fee. He agreed to save Christ Church the expense of bonding the Building Fund Treasurer for \$50,000.00 by requiring three signatures on all Building Fund checks. The signatures were to be those of Senior Warden Jerome Tillman, James D. Carroll, Chairman of the Building

Committee, and Fr. White.

Bishop Barnwell would be out of country on an extended European trip at the time of the cornerstone laying. Consequently, he approved the appointment of Arthur Goodin as his deputy for the service. As the final issue, the vestrymen raised the possibility of bids on the new church exceeding the money available for construction "in view of the Bishop's anticipated absence abroad." Barnwell responded that, if bids were more than available funds, the Building Committee should "make the necessary loans, if any, at a local bank, and the matter would be taken care of on his return." The final statement in the minutes of this meeting declared: "The foregoing points are made record of and introduced into the records of the Vestry in order to indicate approval by the Bishop, of necessary future acts of the Vestry."

After the meeting with Bishop Barnwell much of the building project activity dealt with matters such as insurance on the new church while it was constructed. Vestry Clerk Robert G. Macks had correspondence with Zoe Colburn, Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocesan Executive Committee, including a letter to Miss Colburn on May 4, 1948, that obviously answered a letter from her that is no longer in the Parish records. He responded to her inquiry about insurance, "At the moment nothing can be done about insurance on the new building. When construction is undertaken, the contractor will place his construction risk, and we take over when the building is delivered to us."

Christ Church Preschool Starts a New Year

Three teachers and three aides began the 2011-2012 school year on September 6 at Christ Episcopal Preschool.

Elise Sandbach and aide Carrie Kendrick teach the 4year old class; Norma Tomberlin and aide Patricia Greneker teach the 3-year old class; and Betsy Kirk and aide Laura Sartin teach the 2½-year old class. The 4-year old class has 14 students; the 3-year old class has 13 and the 2½-year old class has 7.

The bright, cheerful, newly repainted rooms provide a colorful background for art displays and teaching materials.
