- Requested Vestry approval of continuation of our three deacons' work at Christ Church after Fr. Ingeman retires.

A TIME APART

El Pedregal and College Ministry



One of my life's greatest pleasures is returning to El Pedregal in the Dominican Republic. The pleasure is twofold. First of all, I love the work that Christ Church has accomplished in the life of this village. Where there was once an empty lot, there now stands an icon in the community, the Church of The Transfiguration, a reminder of God's love. Behind the church is a school that provides hope for tomorrow. The second aspect of my pleasure is from the joy I see in the faces of God's people. They are excited when someone returns to check on their progress. Julius and I were there from February 9-12 for the convention of the Episcopal Diocese of the Dominican Republic,

where I presented greetings to Bishop Holguín and the delegates from Bishop Benhase and the Diocese of Georgia.

Our primary mission in El Pedregal is providing financial support for the school. Last year, we provided scholarship support for 27 children. These children attend school every day with the hope that a good education will enhance the quality of their lives. They are grateful that the members of Christ Church invest in their future. The knitting ministry is also crucial because it gives women a way to help feed their families and gives them a place to meet with other woman from the community. Our Dominican friends are very grateful that Christ Church has been so supportive over the last decade. International mission work is a way to say that we care about the world; we care about the lives of the people who live in it; and we care enough to answer the call to mission.

Our college ministry is branching out. They will provide a meal for students who are in Valdosta working for Habitat for Humanity at the Collegiate Challenge, then work with them the next day. This semester they also would like to work at the food bank and go canoeing.

All our youth did a great job representing Christ Church at the diocesan convention! Griff Holland spoke about Vocare; Clinton Anthony spoke about Canterbury Club in Valdosta; and Andrew Greneker spoke about Happening. I also want to thank Molly Stevenson, Jonathan Ariail, and Jay Connell who spoke on video about the importance of their youth experience in the Diocese of Georgia. Greetings.

At February's vestry meeting, The Rev. Frank Logue, Canon to the Ordinary in our diocese, visited to discuss the upcoming transition process. Fr. Ingeman retires July 31, and his last Sunday will be July 29. The diocesan Transition

Handbook suggests that Canon Logue visit the following Sunday to preach and celebrate, giving the parish the opportunity "to participate in a theological reflection upon the challenges and opportunities of an interim period." How long the interim period lasts is to be determined, but conventional wisdom puts it at 12 to 18 months. The first order of business for your vestry will be to begin the process of choosing an interim rector. Canon Logue said his goal is to supply a preliminary list of potential interim candidates by the end of March. He stressed that input from the parish is encouraged, so if you know someone you think would be a good fit, give me the name, and I'll get it to Canon Logue. The process will take time, and I believe patience and communication will be vitally important, almost as important as prayer. Peace.

1. Favorite memory of Christ Church

When I think back to my time at Christ Church, first as a college student, then as a peer minister, then as a young adult, a mom, and a youth minister...there is a flood of memories. It is the people of Christ Church around whom the memories are rooted. They allowed and encouraged me to think about what I believed without judging me. I remember loving there was an 11:30a.m. service on Sunday mornings so I could actually make it to church on time. I remember the Louttit's big yellow van, "Aslan", and having to drive teens in it when I'd never driven a stick shift, much less, on the column (I pushed the clutch, Amy Louttit Johnson changed the gears). I remember meeting Skip and Pops (Stouffer) and even at the time thanking God for their love and guidance, and learning from them that one is never too old to do youth ministry. I remember the teens with whom I did ministry, with whom I shared many sacred times and many times of laughter, who taught me so much, and who allowed me to love them, and who I still have fun following (thank goodness for Facebook). And, I remember encountering the Holy One, time and time and time again.



2. Favorite memory of Honey Creek

Honey Creek was and is a sanctuary for me. Whether it was camp or Happening or Toil & Sweat or, or , or ... it mattered not. At Honey Creek, as a teen, I was the me God created. I knew I was loved. And, I was free to love. I made friends in my teens that I have 35 years later. As an adult, serving as Happening Coordinator and Diocesan Youth Coordinator and eventually Summer Camp Director, Honey Creek continued to be "holy ground." Lives



are literally changed there, mine included. I remember lying on the cold floor of the Chapel sharing the depths of my soul and knowing that grace would protect my confession. I remember clearing the path for the outdoor stations of the cross and later the outdoor altar. I remember watching the dolphins, playing camper-counselor softball games, and designing and leading youth events so other kids could know God. I remember a trillion candles that Pam Guice and Henry Louttit would light; just in case you didn't know God lived in the Honey Creek Chapel, there could no longer be any doubt. And, I remember the tears (both of joy and sorrow) shed --- the most profound tears of my life have been received by that holy ground.

3. Favorite memory of a priest at Christ Church

I will

never forget going to visit Fr. Louttit to talk to him about how to get rid of the crazy idea that was haunting me about being a priest. I had my speech prepared and rehearsed about how I was going insane. He totally disarmed me with words similar to "what took you so long to get here?" He was supposed to talk me out of priesthood. Priests had books, I didn't like books, I liked toys. How could I be a priest? Fr. Louttit's response, "Sonia, how can you not?" That moment will never leave me.

4. What's in the water in Valdosta that makes us special?

This answer is obvious to me genuine love and care for the other. Teens and young adults are regarded as real members of the church. They are challenged to think on their own and to discover and use their gifts. They are raised up as valued members of the community. The word "authentic" keeps coming to me -- worship, service, and leadership are authentic at Christ Church.

The Church Bookshelf

Trusting, dear readers, in your forgiving hearts, I am reviewing a book I plan to finish by Easter. I believe that Lent itself is a process, calling us to refocus and reshape our lives by chipping away at the excesses and smoothing out the rough spots. Hence the *Toolbox*, a useful collection of, as the subtitle says, *The Nuts and Bolts of Everyday Benedictine Living*. Beginning with a call to discern God's presence in the ordinary, the author presents a brief history of St. Benedict. She guides us through the art of *lectio divina*, that foundational and illuminating practice of praying with scripture, and then introduces the Benedictine values of stability, obedience, and conversion of life, values foundational to balanced lives of work, study, prayer, and rest. Last of all is a chapter on developing a Rule of Life, something we all need to reconsider from time to time; such a rule is a "holy treasure trove" that is above all paradoxically liberating, freeing us to run joyfully toward the light of life. With God's help, may we find the tools to open our lives to holiness this Lent.

In the Dominican Republic, Our Companion Diocese

The three-phase Dominican mission trip by The Rev. Tar Drazdowski, Julius Ariail and Savannah Spivey from Feb. 8 - 21 began and ended in the Orlando airport. For phase one, Tar+ and Julius attended the DR Diocesan Convention in El Pedregal, the site of 10 mission trips by Christ Church. Phase two continued in Santo Domingo, where Tar+ represented the Diocese of Georgia at the Dominican Development Group. Phase three began on Tuesday, 02/14, with the arrival of six people from the Diocese of Georgia, including Savannah, who then travelled around the DR to several sites exploring opportunities for mission work. Christ Church Looks Back

history article, Vestry Clerk Robert G. Macks explained at length to Zoë Coburn, Secretary-Treasurer of the Executive Council of the Diocese of Georgia, that her fears about possible disruption of her vacation by Christ Church's need to pay building costs were pointless. As he said to Miss Coburn in his letter of July 12, 1948, "one of us is laboring under a misapprehension."

In her response the next day, Miss Coburn wrote, "... I checked again on the change of handling Valdosta affairs and find that I misunderstood[,] for which I am more than grateful." She also declared, "... I learned that it is only through you that I handle funds for you to handle there---just as the bishop had told me---so when you begin to need the money you may call on me and before going away we will have in your hands whatever funds we hold for that purpose." Not content with that missive to Macks, she wrote him again on July 14th, and in her new letter claimed that she was "overjoyed to know that I had misunderstood." Once more she assured Macks that she would transfer money from the Diocese to Christ Church as required. "Whenever you need the money I have," she wrote, "let me know. I shall check with you before I go away, in case I have not heard from you, and send you what funds I have on hand."

Though the issue of how the diocese would pay its gift toward *The Vineyard*, p. 10, March 2012

construction of the new Christ Church seemed to have been put to rest, the Vestry continued to be concerned about money. The specific source of anxiety was how to acquire funds sufficient to pay for erection of the "Assembly Hall" [i.e., the Parish Hall] at the same time as the church was built. In Vestry's meeting on July 18, 1948, Senior Warden Jerome Tillman provided an account of pledges "due to the program" and "funds in hand." In light of the information from Mr. Tillman, the group's consensus was that "we would simply work toward as much as we can, pressing for a new 'drive' after the commencement of actual work on the new property. . . . " And, looking ahead to tasks still to do, vestrymen selected Noah Fry and Glenn Robinson to serve as a "furnishings committee."

At the next Vestry session on July 31, 1948, Fr. White joined the Furnishings Committee, following which "he presented many samples received from business houses he had contacted." Vestrymen yet again discussed the cornerstone at length and agreed to the placement inside the stone of an airtight liner of copper or aluminum that would contain various items such as a "Bible, Prayer Book, name of Vicar and Vestry." They reaffirmed their previous decision that the existing cornerstone from the building on East Central Avenue "be worked over and the date of construction of the new Church be added." They decided as well that letters should be sent to "all members of the

Church who had not contributed to the building fund" to solicit contributions from them.

In early September the Macks-Coburn correspondence resumed. On the fourth of that month, Macks informed Miss Coburn that "all seems now set for the church. The contract has been let---and the construction is actually under way." The Building Committee, he said, was now dealing with the "matters of the construction bond and the builder's risk [insurance]...." As he had previously informed Miss Coburn, "we will hold the policies here, notifying you of the company, number and coverage," which was not at all what she wanted. Her view was that the insurance policies should be sent to her to be held in the diocesan office, a procedure she had suggested indirectly in correspondence with Macks months earlier. He now told Miss Coburn that, according to the construction contract, payments to Tinker Concrete, the builder, would have to begin soon. He recommended, therefore, that she begin to send to Christ Church "such funds as may be available." He added, "It would not be a bad idea to build up our bank balance a bit, as we plan on making a change and hope to profit considerably from the new connection." The term "new connection" evidently was a reference to the relationship with Citizens and Southern National Bank in Valdosta established by depositing Building Fund money with C & S.

5. What was your total educational pattern?

I attended high school at Savannah Christian Prep ['81], Valdosta State for a BBA ['84], Valdosta State for MBA ['89], University of the South in Sewanee for M.Div. ['93]. Add to this, professional training in youth ministry and lots of continuing education in counseling.

6. If you were not a priest, what profession would you have chosen?

After college, I worked in the corporate office of Playland Toy Stores, then non-profits in organizational disciplines including youth ministry locally and nationally (Exec. Dir. of Nat'l Happening-8 years; Youth Ministry Consultant-10 years), so I imagine I'd be...a professional youth minister or in management of non-profits or both! After having served as a Chaplain at Trinity Prep, I have also discovered that I love to teach and coach, so maybe I would have done that too?!

7. Do you still use that other interest in your ministry?
