## From the Rector

#### TELL THEM WHAT HE TOLD THEM

The Army has a formula, a procedure, to be followed in virtually every situation; it saves time and prevents confusion. There is even a formula to be followed for



public speaking, for presentations and it is this: (1) Tell what you are going to tell them; (2) Tell them; (3) Tell what you told them; then sit down. So let's talk about Sunday school and all of Christian Education. We are approaching the Feast of the Resurrection, Easter, the supreme moment of Christian Education. Jesus had taken care of step (1). He had preached the resurrection, spoken plainly to his disciples and to multitudes about overwhelming, transcending love. God had taken care of step (2) at the moment of Resurrection when that love, preached by Jesus, had been made unmistakably real and present in this world. So there is step (3). That's our job. We are here to tell them what Our Lord and God the Father have done in that Easter moment. If we fail to do so the message may well be lost. We have 50 days in Easter. Jesus used forty of them, before His Ascension to do, what you and I must do now, educate a generation. This Easter season we have a very special Adult Program in the Parish Hall during our Sunday school hour. Have a cup of coffee, have a snack, but above all, if we are to take responsibility for a new generation, please come.

#### **Missioners or Mission Field?**



According to the *Book of Common Prayer*, the mission of the Church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ. The Church pursues its mission as it prays and worships, proclaims the Gospel, and promotes justice, peace and love. The Church carries out this mission through the ministry of all its members. As the Body of Christ works out its mission, the mission takes on all types of shapes and sizes. We all have the opportunity to participate in the mission of the church. Sometimes we are the missioners and sometimes we are the mission field.

On March 8th, the students from Jamestown College in Jamestown, North Dakota, came to Valdosta to participate in Collegiate Challenge, a program sponsored by Habitat for Humanity. In a very real way they came to Valdosta with the intent to help someone have a decent and affordable house in which to live. Was it mission work to them? For some of them it was, and for some, maybe not. Frequently, we engage the mission of the church because it is the right thing to do or because it gives us great pleasure, and it does not seem like work at all.

Canterbury Club decided they wanted to host the dinner for the students from Jamestown. During dinner, our students provided them hospitality, and then the next morning, they joined them on the job site. The work was intentional. It was an example of how sharing a meal and extending the hand of hospitality is one of the many ways of accomplishing the mission of the church.

Mission opportunities are always before us! It is our decision to engage them or not. There are very exciting things happening at Christ Church, Valdosta. Christ Church is a community of individuals who have a reputation for taking the mission of the church seriously. If you have not found your place in that work, just keep your eyes open and God will show you how to use your time, talent and treasure to work in the mission field he has designed for you.

## Charles Davis, Jr. in his own words

#### 1. Favorite memory of Christ Church

The richness of my experience at Christ Church makes it hard to say there is a favorite memory. It is the people I remember most clearly and the love they were willing to share with me during my years in Valdosta. Worship was central. Mom and Dad moved to Honey Creek in 1978; I was attending Augusta College and was living at home. I chose Valdosta State because of Christ Church and your community of faith. Sunday mornings were glorious, rich experiences. I remember singing and playing the guitar; being challenged by Henry to function as lector and sing in the adult choir. I remember the celebrations that took place on the lawn after worship and the joy that you shared with me. I remember suppers and music and laughter. It truly was a celebration of being in communion. My favorite memory really is a collection of many memories that were filled with love and support during my college years.

One of my favorite memories was very embarrassing. My first experience leading the prayers was a disaster. As I read the prayers I came to the last of the prayers in Form IV which reads, "we commend to your mercy...." I said, "we condemn to your mercy...." It took a while for the laughter to die down before he could continue. It was the last time I was asked to read the prayers.

#### 2. Favorite memory of Honey Creek

I had the great opportunity to experience Honey Creek in a unique way. Dad and Mom shared the ministry of leading Honey Creek while I was at VSC. Not only did I have the opportunity to spend time there each summer but it was where I spent Christmas and Thanksgiving. Summers were always special with camps and all the activities that make summers at Honey Creek unique. I had the great joy to participate in Cursillo and Happening. My Cursillo changed and shaped me in that glorious space.

But there is one moment I remember more than any other. Summer camps had finished. As I was sitting near the dock I heard a sound. I did not know what it was or where it was coming from. At first it was startling, then scary, this sound that seemed to appear from the emptiness of the dark night. It repeated several times. Finally I realized what I was listening to. Dolphins had come into the creek and each time one breached the surface they would release their breath and take in another. I sat and listened for 30 minutes before they finally made their way out of the creek. For a time that night I listened to them breathe and I listened to my own breath. Very few times have I felt as at peace in the midst of God's creation as I did at that moment. Honey Creek will always be for me holy ground.

#### 3. Favorite memory of a priest at Christ Church

Henry was my priest. From the moment I



arrived, I knew that Henry and Jan and their girls were there for me. Henry and Jan always had time for me. My favorite memories are of their home. The menagerie of creatures always felt like an adventure, and I had the great joy to add to their collection. "Smokey" was a pigeon rescued from a fire on VSC campus. I remember clearly their willingness to take him on and care for him. To go to their home and hear their stories was wonderful, but more wonderful was the time that they always had for me. It seemed that whatever I needed, whatever the situation, there was always room for me at their home. I think I would like to "grow up" and be a priest like Henry. I'm just not willing to wear those madras pants.

## 4. What's in the water in Valdosta that makes us special?

I'm going to change the question a little: What makes Christ Church special? There is nothing in the water, but God's Holy Spirit does seem to be especially lively in you. I found in Christ Church an ability to welcome, greet, and include. You did that for me. I know that I felt special. But as I look back, I realize you made all of us

The Dream of the Rood by Caedmon (?) or Cynewulf (?). 8th century.

"The Dream of the Rood," perhaps the earliest Old English Christian poem, is an evocative and

moving Easter reflection in which a dreamer recounts a vision . . .

I beheld the tree of the Mystery rise in the heavens, spinning out rays of perfect light. That beacon glowed spattered with gold, shining with jewels, clear to earth's corners: five gems defined the crossbeam.

But the "tree" becomes drenched with blood. And then it speaks of the day it was severed from its roots and placed on a hill, to be the "high gallows" for a resolute Warrior, "eager to ransom mankind." Because it refuses to "crush all those fiends" without the Lord's consent, it too suffers the wounds of the nails.

The rood, or cross, recounts its agony: it is scourged by fiends, and it grieves over the death of the Warrior. It too is buried and then exalted, dressed in gold and silver, blessed as the tree of the Mystery:

the whole glorious creation worships this beacon. On me God's Son suffered his trial. Now I am exalted, towering under Heaven, and I can save every person who looks to me.

"My purpose comes straight from the cross," the dreamer says near the end. May we have the grace to echo his words.

[Lines from the poem appear on the 8th-century Ruthwell Cross in Dumfriesshire, Scotland, and the fullest version of the poem is in the Vercelli text, in Italy.]

### **Christ Church Looks Back**

uring the Vestry meeting of September 5, 1948, Senior Warden Jerome Tillman provided a succinct account "of the building situation." As he reported, the Building Fund had \$28,187.15 in hand, with \$23,000.00 still to come from the Diocese of Georgia. The bad news was that the total of \$51,187.15 was "not enough for our purposes, and we must add to our funds, especially securing payment of promises and unpaid pledges." As Mr. Tillman summarized the situation, Christ Church required \$2,136.00 more "to actually complete the building (without assembly hall)" and would need another six to seven thousand dollars to purchase "furniture and fixtures." Vestry Clerk Bob Macks noted that "construction bond had been placed and issued, covering [the] performance of Mr. Tinker, the contractor."

Vicar Clifton H. White, informed Vestry that plans for "a larger and more efficient kitchen" than originally visualized had been completed and accepted by the women of the Church and by the Building Committee. He confirmed that he and supervising architect Lloyd Greer had the task of selecting the hardware and lighting fixtures for the building. Also, he said, the cornerstone from the original Christ Church on East Central Avenue "had been cleaned and re-engraved and was ready to be reset." Thereupon, Vestry decided to hold the cornerstone laying ceremony on Friday, September 10, 1948, with Mr. Arthur Goodin serving as the deputy for Bishop Barnwell, who was still in Europe.

In the next meeting, on October 3, 1948, Vestry dealt with additional building project business. Fr. White raised the "matter of insurance on the new building. The decision, after discussion, was to purchase \$50,000.00 worth of "Builder's Risk" insurance, half of which would come from the McKey-Tillman Agency and the other half from the Bass Insurance Agency. The coverage was to be obtained at "prevailing rates," and the Diocese of Georgia would be the beneficiary.

Though unmentioned in the Minutes of October 3, 1948, Vestry apparently urged Mr. Macks to contact Zoë Coburn, Secretary-Treasurer of the Executive Committee of the Diocese of Georgia, about the \$23,000.00 Christ Church still had not received for the Building Fund. The next day, Macks wrote Miss Coburn to remind her that on September 4, 1948, he had sent a letter to her "asking that, at your convenience, whatever funds available for Christ Church Building Fund be sent on to us." He observed that after a month's wait, he had heard nothing from her. Macks also declared that, several payments already having been made to the contractor, H.G. Tinker Concrete, "we will be in a position of needing additional funds in very short order." Therefore, "your taking care of this matter will be sincerely appreciated." As a closing note, he reported that "Contractor's Construction Bond and Builder's Risk Insurance have both been placed in requisite amount."

Macks's letter elicited a quick response from Miss Coburn, who wrote on October 5th that she owed him an apology. His September 4th letter had been on her desk when she returned from vacation on September 16th. She claimed that her desk had been piled "high with mail" and that Bishop Barnwell had arrived home from his European trip at the same time. The consequence was her not knowing "what to do first" and thus she filed his missive without acting on it. Her return letter of October 5th also contained a check for \$23,000.00. Miss Coburn already had paid John C. LeBey, the architect, his fee of \$2,000.00 before she departed for vacation. In closing, she wrote, "I hope I have not inconvenienced you. Had matters been reversed I would have been very angry. Terribly sorry."

Macks received the Coburn letter and the check the following day, October 6, 1948. In a letter to Jamie Carroll, Chairman of the Building Committee, he reported that he had the check, which was in Macks's name, in hand. As he wrote, "Why the check was made out to me is a question I cannot answer, but I have endorsed it and am turning it over to you herewith." However, before mailing the letter and check to Mr. Carroll, Macks contacted him by telephone and was told to deposit the check in the Building Fund account at Citizens and Southern National Bank, which he did. In a postscript in the Carroll letter, he confirmed that "I have deposited the check to the account of the Christ Church Building Fund in the Citizens and Southern National Bank and enclose herewith duplicate deposit slip."

transients feel special. Henry invited me to join in your stewardship program about twenty years ago. Alicia, Sara, Coleman, and I came from Ocean Springs, Mississippi, where I was the rector of St. John's Episcopal Church, to join you for a weekend. At the parish dinner I told the story of a California psychological study where every teacher in the school was told they had an exceptional student in their class. Because the teacher didn't know which student was exceptional, he or she treated them all as special and all tested higher. Of course the change took place because of the expectations and time which they had been given. The teachers expected something extra-ordinary and the students began to believe in themselves. They began to live out those expectations.

In our Baptismal Covenant we are challenged with this question: "Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself." Christ Church is special because you see the Christ in others more than they can ever see in themselves. It was the gift you gave me.

#### 5. What was your total educational pattern

I went to St. Andrews High School outside the gates of Sewanee. Dad was a senior at The School of Theology when I was a senior. My first two years of college was at Augusta College. I transferred to Valdosta in 1976 and graduated in 1979. I entered The General Theological Seminary in 1982 and graduated in 1985.

### 6. If you were not a priest, what profession would you have chosen?

From my earliest memories I have been called to serve at God's altar. It is very difficult to imagine doing anything else. At the age of seven and after two sets of confirmation classes, Bishop Stuart consented to my confirmation. In Jesup at that time confirmation was a requirement to be an acolyte and I knew that I was supposed to serve. I asked Santa, at thirteen, for acolyte vestments. I can't imagine any other vocation. For my earliest memories I expressed clearly that perceived call. I do remember being asked by the Bishop of Atlanta what I would do if I couldn't be a priest. I responded that I thought I would like to open a limited menu comedy bar. He looked at me and responded that it sounded a lot like church. The truth is that I do not know what else I would have done.

#### 7. Do you still use that other interest in your ministry?

My priesthood is a part of me. It is who I am. Charles has been called and all that I am and all the gifts that I have been given have found their way into living out this impossible, wonderful vocation.
