- Announced the upcoming schedule of services and special events for the next month.
- Announced the Dominican Republic Dinner and Silent Auction as Thursday, May 17, with the auction ending after the 11:30 a.m. service on May 20.
- Discussed the need for space in the new building for the Parents Morning Out group. All 15 students need to be in one room or they will need 4 staff members instead of two.

This has been a mission site for teams from Christ Church and the Diocese of Georgia since 2001, and we have all benefitted greatly from the relationships we have developed with the residents there. My husband, Jim, and I had the special pleasure of welcoming one of those residents, Ana Maria Quiroz, to our home in Valdosta from May 10-13. Through the efforts of many mission team veterans, Ana Maria has come to the US for medical treatment not readily available to her in the Dominican Republic, and we are pleased to

be able to support her during her treatment and recovery.

In addition to Jim and me, our 2012 mission team has seven other members: Julia and Julius Ariail, Grady Lacy, Cathy Rippeon (my sister from Maryland!), Elizabeth Welch, Marilynne Marshall, and Jim Ellis Fisher. Greetings.

A busy agenda greeted your vestry at its May meeting as we move closer to the completion of our education building as well as the retirement of Father Ingeman. The new building is taking definitive shape, and everyone who has

toured the facility is somewhat surprised and very impressed by the space it will provide. Construction remains on schedule, and we continue to look forward to the building's dedication on July 29 when Bishop Benhase joins us. It will be a bittersweet day as it also marks Father Ingeman's final Sunday before he and Happy begin well-deserved retirement. The Ingemans plan to remain in Valdosta, but Episcopal Church canons require that "he absent himself from his former parish for at least two years, and may return as a member of the congregation at the discretion of the new rector."

Before a search committee is formed to seek a new rector, we will hire an interim priest for a minimum of a year. Father Frank Logue, canon to the ordinary in our diocese, has provided information on one interim possibility and has promised to send vitas on three and possibly four more. When these are in hand, the interview process will begin. Logue anticipates an interim rector could be on the job "around Labor Day".

The Church Bookshelf

Stepping-Stones: A Journey Through the Ice Age Caves of the Dordogne by Christine Desdemaines-Hugon. Yale University Press, 2010



To this intriguing book, an eminent anthropologist invites us to walk through the caves of the Dordogne in south-west France, where prehistoric artists from the Upper Paleolithic (35,000-10,000 years ago) took ochre, charcoal, and manganese, fashioned brushes and tools, and created stunning wall drawings. Here a bulge in the rock becomes the rounded body of a woolly mammoth; there the artist's finger traces outlines of horses, bisons, and mysterious geometric symbols. These hidden places have profound spiritual impact, calling us to meditate, to "cave dream" about questions galore. Why are these evocative drawings so hidden? Why so few human images? What is the reason for the animals' direction, for their interactions, for their placement? Lacking a written record, we may never know. Yet in the drawings' complexity and mystery we glimpse later artistic practices — the Renaissance use of perspective, the line drawings of Matisse. Most importantly, as the author points out, our preconceptions of early human beings are reshaped by the beauty and mystery of the drawings, where we unexpectedly "perceive an intelligence and a sensibility." From the perspective of this reader, newly returned from Rouffignac and Lascaux, the book raises questions about what future generations will discover about us. These Paleolithic people walked with courage and faith along an uncertain path into the blackness of a cave, where, by the flickering light of a tiny oil lamp, they created artwork of overwhelming importance. And that, perhaps, is a metaphor for life itself.

1. Favorite memory of Christ Church

5. What was your total educational pattern - high school, college, and seminary?

High School - 1974 graduate of Gaithersburg High School in Gaithersburg, MD, BS in Education, MA in Behavior Disorders, MA in Counseling and Guidance all from Valdosta State, and Master of Divinity from Vancouver School of Theology.

6. If you were not a priest, what profession would you have chosen?

I worked 30 years in the education system and retired in 2010. When I was young I considered being a paramedic, a railroad engineer, a park ranger or a federal marshal - none of which

was open to women at the time.

Christ Church Looks Back

n a called meeting on November 19, 1948, in the presence of Bishop ▲ Middleton S. Barnwell, five vestrymen debated the question of how to build the "assembly hall," which had been part of the original plan for the new Christ Church. Because of insufficient funds, Vestry had chosen to omit the structure when dealing with the second round of bids in July 1948. Now, the initial focus of discussion was the possibility of a temporary structure; Vestry, however, turned down that idea. Thereupon, Bishop Barnwell suggested that Christ Church borrow money for the building. He declared that he favored carrying out the project, given the proposal by the contractor, Mr. Tinker, to reduce the cost by a thousand dollars provided "construction of the. .. [building] could be started at once." The Bishop also pledged that Christ Church would have his "full cooperation" in making arrangements to acquire a loan.

Meanwhile, the construction of the church and the "parish house" continued and required attention. In the regular Vestry meeting of December 5, 1948, Fr. White reported that "the contract for complete furnishings for the Church had been let on December 4 for a total consideration of \$3,333.50." The contractor had promised to deliver all furnishings but the pews by December 20. Unfortunately, the Minutes do not identify the firm receiving the contract, but it may have been the "church furnishing company North of Atlanta" mentioned in the May 2012

history article. The sequel to Fr. White's report was talk about the feasibility of having the Christmas Eve service in the new building by using temporary seating. The decision, however, was to have no services in the new building until all furnishings were in place.

In the same session, Vestry also addressed the "assembly hall" [i.e. the Parish Hall] project, into which Bishop Barnwell had injected new life. Members heard that the Bishop had given oral permission by telephone for Christ Church to proceed with a loan for construction of the building. Vestry then decided that Senior Warden Jerome Tillman should contact Barnwell for "specific information" about how to handle such a construction loan. Mr. Tillman added that the Citizens and Southern National Bank of Valdosta was prepared to "lend us the money on a yearly basis provided [the] loan can be made on a legal basis."

At a later called meeting, Mr. Tillman recounted his conversation with the Bishop. The plan that had emerged from their discussion was for Christ Church to incorporate the Vestry "and its successors." When the incorporation process was completed, the Bishop "would convey to the corporation title to the church property, which could. . . [serve as security] for the required loan." The immediate aftermath of Tillman's report was that Vestry approved a motion to proceed with incorporation and asked the Clerk, Mr. Macks, to obtain from Bishop Barnwell "written confirmation of his verbal proposition to Mr. Tillman." Also, Vestry authorized

the Building Committee to convey to Mr. Tinker a work order for the "immediate completion" of the Parish Hall, contingent upon incorporation of the Vestry and receipt of the needed funds via bank loan. As the Minutes pointed out, the two contingency points "were to be covered in the authorization granted to Mr. Tinker."

Mr. Macks duly requested from Bishop Barnwell that he confirm in writing his proposal to the Senior Warden that "the church property would, on incorporation, be conveyed to the Vestry and could then be used as security for the necessary mortgage."

Macks, in the same letter, told Barnwell that the Vestry on December 19, 1948, had approved unanimously a motion to incorporate itself to be able to "mortgage church property after conveyance by you of said property."

The Bishop responded in a letter of January 4, 1949, in which he wrote, "The Valdosta church property stands in the name of the Protestant Episcopal in the Diocese of Georgia." He added that, the previous day, the Corporation had passed a resolution "authorizing me as President to sign a mortgage note and deed of debt to secure mortgage for the borrowing of \$15,000." Barnwell had ascertained that the Citizens and Southern Bank in Savannah "was perfectly willing to let me have the money" but preferred that "it be handled by the Valdosta branch...." The Savannah bank would provide the funds at four and one-half percent per year, and Barnwell opined, "if the Valdosta bank takes the loan they certainly ought not to charge us more than that."
