Vestry Report from October 22, 2012

- Established a plan to organize the search committee for the next rector by inquiring from parishioners whom they would nominate, submitting the names to the senior warden or priests and voting at the November meeting of the vestry.
- Received report from the junior warden on several church repair projects - the outdoor light poles, the fountain and signage.
- Thanked the anonymous donor for the new carpet in the parish hall and suggested we work on replacing the chairs next.
- Named two new committees -Technology with Julius Ariail as chair; and Communications with Julia Ariail as chair.
- Voted to hire the STS company to rewire the offices and Virtual World to service and backup our computer systems on a yearly contract.

Children - bring a bell to ring and a candle to place before the Christ child!








Camellia Garden

Many years ago Christ Church was fortunate to acquire the Sarah Oliver House, which currently houses our Rectory. The property surrounding the house was maintained during Mrs. Oliver's lifetime as a beautiful camellia garden, which many of our past parishioners frequented. Hulyn Smith grafted many new camellias from the old growth. Though many years have passed and the garden has become overgrown, the camellias still survive. Recently, as a memorial to their dear friends Hulyn and Janet Smith, the Valdosta Camellia and Garden Club contributed money to revitalize the gardens. Funds provided are enough to provide the master plan, irrigation system, and initial cleanup of the site. In addition to the generous donation, they are also cultivating several of the thirty-six camellias developed by Hulyn that will be planted at Christ Church. A work day is being planned with our EYC and other parishioners to preserve the garden and prepare it for the master plan. Paths, benches and other items (perhaps given as memorials or honorariums) can be added to the site, bringing

An interview with the author of "Holy and Unholy Deacons in Late Nineteenth-Century Verse" by the Rev. Deacon Patricia Marks

"Holy and Unholy Deacons in Late Nineteenth-Century Verse," published in Christianity and Literature, Winter 2012: 241-264.

What motivated you to write about this subject?

Much of my research over the past years has been about satire and caricature in late 19th century periodicals, especially those that are unindexed. I've always been

interested in the popular response to events like the visit of the great French actress Sarah Bernhardt or such well-known authors as Oscar Wilde and Charles Dickens. Those responses, whether they

are comical drawings, verse, or parodies, say a good deal about the cultural expectations of the day. The same can be said for other figures as well.

Where did you do your research?

I started research on my holy and unholy colleagues around three years ago, when I stumbled across short stories about deacons published in the 1890's. There were so many that I needed a different approach, and thought that there must be verses (aside from the popular Holmes poem, "The Deacon's Masterpiece, or the Wonderful One-Hoss Shay") written by authors who weren't famous, who were all but forgotten. There are some wonderful resources on the internet, newspapers and other periodicals scanned and just waiting to be searched. Then I went to the Library of Congress in D.C. and happily spent days thumbing through the treasures there.

What is the most interesting fact your learned?

I suppose what was most interesting to me was that the deacon was so present in the popular imagination. Songs, plays, verses, stories – deacons were everywhere in the late nineteenth century. They were neighbors and friends; they were active in community and church.

What other articles do you have in progress?

At this point, I have two other articles pending. In looking at short stories about deacons, I discovered Robert Mahaffay, a Seattle Times staff correspondent and free-lance fiction writer, who published an intriguing series in Star Western in the 1930's and 1940's. I had a lot to learn – I had never done research on the wild West! So I read all the stories I could get my hands on and eventually went to the University of Washington in Seattle to look through the Mahaffay papers. "Deacon Bottle of the Wild West: Robert E. Mahaffay's Pulp Hero," will be appearing soon in The Journal of the West. I'm also waiting to hear

about another article, this one examining the unexpectedly



supportive response of the satirical magazine Puck to Johnson Chesnut Whittaker, the African-American cadet ostracized and expelled from West Point in 1880 and posthumously awarded a commission in



1995. It was a case that generated intense interest and one that is emblematic of the personal tragedy engendered by discrimination.

What else are you writing?

I'm also working on a series of meditations – familiar parables and miracles seen through the eyes of bystanders. Some I've given as Vespers homilies, others not. This is a lo-o-o-ng-term project.

The Rev. Deacon Patricia Marks earned an undergraduate degree from Douglass College and a Ph. D. in English from Michigan State University. She retired after a 30-year career as a Professor of English at Valdosta State. She has authored five books, over 40 articles and 24 academic papers. *The Vineyard* featured her in the April 2009 issue available on the church website.

ovember's history article began tying up loose ends from the building of the new Christ Church, including the Parish Hall, in 1948 and 1949. One unfinished piece of business was Mixer Electric Company's \$156.00 bill for wiring the stove and oven in the kitchen. As previously related, Vestry received the written invoice on May 1, 1949, and approved payment "as part of the Church installation." Also, as reported, the charges, for reasons now unclear, provoked controversy that continued meeting after meeting in the remainder of 1949 and did not end until September 1950.

For example, the Vestry minutes of March 4, 1950, stated, "[Senior Warden Jerome] Tillman is handling the Mixer situation." The minutes of April 14, 1950, reported that the "Mixer situation was mentioned. In view of no figures from Mixer, no action." Minutes from the May 7, 1950, meeting declared, "In the absence of details from Mixer as to his long outstanding bill, matter was left in status quo, pending further advices from him." On July 21, 1950, Senior Warden Jerome Tillman "requested that he be placed on record as rejecting the Mixer bill as presented." The parish records provide no indication of the nature of the Mixer bill "presented" at that meeting. The culmination of efforts to clear the disputed charges from Mixer Electric came finally at the Vestry's session on September 10, 1950. At the bottom of the minutes of that date appears the following blunt statement:

Christ Church Looks Back by Joseph A. Tomberlin

"There will be no further discussion of the Mixer bill in any Vestry meeting." Christ Church's minutes book does not contain any further reference to the issue, so, as pointed out in November, "it is not clear that it was ever resolved."

The remaining topic to be clarified is the financing for the building of Christ Church's Parish Hall, then known as the "assembly hall." For those wishing to refresh their memories, Christ Church's efforts to obtain \$15,000.00 to construct the Parish Hall were explored in considerable detail in the June 2012, July 2012, and August 2012 issues of The Vineyard. In brief, as Bishop Middleton S. Barnwell recommended, Christ Church's Vestry incorporated itself to be able legally to mortgage church property to borrow the necessary funds. Barnwell also suggested the Citizens and Southern National Bank in Savannah or in Valdosta as the source of a loan. In the Vestry meeting of February 6, 1949, Senior Warden Jerome Tillman spoke of "a slight difficulty" with obtaining a loan from the local C & S and said that "he was endeavoring to straighten the matter out." He also mentioned that Christ Church might acquire the money from a private source instead of C & S. That is precisely what occurred; regrettably, Christ Church's records contain a very slight paper trail for the historian to follow in reconstructing the story. However, scattered clues provide enough information that the story can be told in a sketchy fashion.

First, on March 8, 1949, Zoë Coburn, of the diocesan office, sent a letter to Mr. Tillman, in which she wrote, "Immediately upon receipt of your telegram today I made up deposit [of \$15,000.00] as requested and left this with Mr. Joseph Harrison, Vice President of the Citizens & Southern National Bank here [in Savannah], copy of deposit slip enclosed, and he said he would take care of the matter as you requested." The copy of the deposit slip for \$15,000.00 is still attached to Miss Coburn's letter in Christ Church's Minute Book. But there is no copy of Mr. Tillman's telegram outlining his instructions for the bank deposit.

Neither Miss Coburn's letter nor the deposit slip provides an indication of the source of the \$15,000.00, but I assumed that the money came from the Valdosta C & S National Bank. Eventually I found evidence, in Vestry minutes of February 5, 1950, of the inaccuracy of my assumption. Back in March of 1949, Christ Church had been offered a gift of \$5,000.00 by the National Council of the Episcopal Church to aid in defraying construction costs. Now, in the Vestry meeting on February 5, 1950, Senior Warden Jerome Tillman reported that he "had requested the remittance of the \$5,000.00 obtained through the Bishop---to be applied, if possible, in the reduction of the principal of our mortgage, if such a course [is] acceptable to the mortgagor." The next sentence identified a "Mrs. Simpson," not C & S, as the holder of the mortgage.

This story continues in the January 2013 *Vineyard*.
