From the Interim Rector

The Trinity

The earliest symbol for the Trinity was the triangle. The three equal sides forming one complete whole capture some of what it means to be three in one. The Christian teaching of the Trinity is not an explanation of God; it is a description of what we know about God---that God is known in three different ways.

The triangle or triangulation has a different meaning in the psychological world. It is most commonly used to express a situation in which one family member will not communicate directly with another family member, but will communicate with a third family member, which can lead to the third family member becoming part of the triangulation. Triangulation can also be used as a label for a form of "splitting" in which one person plays the third family member against one that he or she is upset about. This is playing the two people against each other, but usually the person doing the splitting will also engage in character assassination.

Those who study systems theory say that families, schools and churches all work the same way. There are healthy ways that we deal with each other and there are unhealthy ways. My grandfather and his two brothers had an argument and for the last twenty years of their lives two of them only "spoke" to each by way of the third brother. Now how ridiculous is that for three Presbyterian elders.

It is always best to speak directly to someone when you have a problem. My daughter's kindergarten teacher always said do not believe everything that your child says that we said here at school and we will not believe everything that she says you said! How teachers hate it when the principal gets a call about something that the parent has not addressed with the teacher first.

If you have a problem with something done at church, then make an appointment and go talk to the person. If you disagree with a sermon, then speak to the person who preached it. Often times what we think we heard was not what was said. Speak for yourself and speak directly to the person that you have a problem with. But for the sake of a healthy church, do not make triangles. Triangulation is not good in families, schools or in churches.

Reflections on 2012

While trying to reflect on 2012, I realize this has been a year of many highs and lows for all of us. One of the questions I always try to ask myself, in good times and in more difficult times, is where is God in all of this. Sometimes the answer to that question comes easily. God's love and grace are always evident when we celebrate our lives together in Christ. In those more difficult times, due to the fallen world in which we live, God's love and grace may not be as apparent. We can be assured of His love, even though because we are human and hurting, we might not always be able to see it.

My greatest spiritual insight this year came in the middle of senseless tragedy. While preparing the sermon for the Sunday evening Eucharist, Advent III, God's small still voice reminded me that we as Christians really do affect what happens in the

world around us. Our behaviors, attitudes, and reactions are like the ripples we see when we cast a stone into water. If you watch, you can see the ripple form into concentric circles.

As Christians, the way we encounter and react to the world around us really matters. It matters to our families, it matters to our community, and it matters to the unsuspecting stranger who doesn't know who we profess to follow.

I hope that in the next year we can remember our Baptismal covenant to treat all of humanity with the respect that is worthy of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Amen.

Greetings.

We now enter a new year, a new beginning, a year which will bring many exciting opportunities as we continue our transition. The search

committee will be confirmed at January's vestry meeting (see details at the bottom of this page), and its serious work will immediately begin in earnest. I firmly believe active participation from the entire parish is critical as the process unfolds. There is no deadline to having our next rector in place. Let the prayers begin, and let them continue.

A deadline that is more pressing is setting a budget for 2013. The finance committee, led by treasurer Carolyn Eager, met in late December but didn't finalize a budget because not enough pledge cards had been received. The good news is the average pledge has increased to almost \$3100 a year. The bad news is, at that time, we had not heard from more than 30 pledging units. To hire a new rector and pay the suggested diocesan salary minimum, our pledge income, which was almost \$319,000 (based on 107 pledging units) in 2012, needs to be a minimum of \$350,000. In late December, we were \$130,000 short of that mark. If you're still on the sideline, please consider coming onto the playing field with your time, talent and treasure. Peace.

Search Committee Information

Phyllis Holland, who has been confirmed as chair of the search committee, postponed selection of the full committee until early January because of the time crunch of busy holiday schedules. She has called a January 3 meeting of the selection committee to choose the five parishioners to join her and vestry liaison Jeani Synyard on the search committee. That list will be presented to the vestry at its January 21 meeting for approval or rejection. Keep in mind, the work of the committee will be intensive. The first task will be to prepare a descriptive booklet about our parish called a Parish Profile. Quoting the diocesan transition handbook: "The profile is used to introduce prospective candidates to the parish and the local community. Topics addressed may include mission or identity statement, a history of the parish, a description of the Diocese of Georgia, the community where the parish is located, parish programs, distinctive features of the parish, finances and stewardship, facilities, staffing, key statistics (membership, worship attendance, etc.) goals, and desired characteristics of the next rector." As you can see, the work of the committee will be intensive and time consuming. Support from the entire parish is critical. Please be involved, respond positively when called upon, offer constructive suggestions and criticism, and keep the committee in your daily prayers. – Steve Roberts.

Christ Church Looks Back

re learned in the December Vineyard that the source of the \$15,000.00 loan Christ Church used to pay for building the Parish Hall was a "Mrs. Simpson," who is not further identified in the Vestry Minute Book. No additional information about her has turned up. Zoë Coburn, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Diocese of Georgia, deposited the proceeds of the Simpson loan in the Citizens and Southern National Bank in Savannah on March 8, 1949. A copy of the deposit slip remains attached to a letter from Miss Coburn in the Vestry Minute Book.

On March 11, 1949, Senior Warden Jerome Tillman received a letter from Bishop Middleton Barnwell about a five-thousand-dollar gift the national church had extended to Christ Church. Barnwell said that the offer had come in a letter from a Dr. Wieland and asserted, "I think the safest thing to do is to accept this gift. . . . " He wrote, "I quite agree with Dr. Wieland that a bird in the hand is worth two in the bush, but I await your instructions before replying." For whatever reason, Mr. Tillman delayed his response until March 28, 1949, when he informed Barnwell that he "had shown your letter to most of the Vestry here and they have agreed to follow your suggestion and accept the gift from the National Council." Tillman said also, "We are most grateful for any and all help we can get, and hope that you will express to Dr. Wieland our

sincerest appreciation of the interest he has shown in our behalf." The Bishop responded tersely on March 30, 1949, "I have written Dr. Wieland for the \$5,000...." Christ Church's Vestry later used the gift, actually slightly less than \$5,000, to accelerate repayment of the loan from Mrs. Simpson.

About a year later, in the Vestry meeting on February 5, 1950, Mr. Tillman declared that he had asked for "the remittance of the \$5,000.00 (approximately) obtained through the Bishop - to be applied, if possible, in the reduction of the principal, if such a course [is] acceptable to the mortgagor [Mrs. Simpson]." He said that, in any case, Christ Church had to pay the specified amount due in 1950. If the "extra payment" were not satisfactory to Mrs. Simpson, he would explore means of investing the \$5,000.00 "and report to the Vestry, with his recommendations, for action by the Vestry as a whole."

Mrs. Simpson obviously considered the additional payment acceptable. According to the Vestry's financial report of February 28, 1950, the five thousand dollars turned out to be \$4,956.28. With that sum added to the amount already due on the principal, Christ Church paid Mrs. Simpson \$7,555.56, as Treasurer Noah Fry disclosed to the Vestry on March 4, 1950. Mr. Fry noted, "Future payments have so been arranged as to clean up the balance of the obligation [in] four years." And he added,

"Present funds are a bit on the low side, but it is felt that generally

speaking, the entire financial situation is in fair shape."

Just after Christ Church made the first large payment on the mortgage a seeming complication occurred. In a called Vestry meeting on March 25, 1950, Mr. Tillman requested action on a letter from Bishop Barnwell, who asked that "the Vestry furnish him with proper evidence of the obligation on the mortgage to be used by him in backing up his unsecured obligation to the Diocese." Vestry then approved a motion that the President and the Treasurer of the Christ Church corporation, meaning the Senior Warden and the Treasurer [Mr. Tillman and Mr. Fry], "be empowered to prepare and submit to the Bishop the proper papers in such form as would be correct and suitable."

The same issue arose again at the next regular Vestry session on April 14, 1950. This time, Mr. Tillman informed Vestry that, "so far as the Diocese was concerned, the obligation of the Vestry, as regards the mortgage, was improperly worded and that the Bishop requested a duplicate of the note to Mrs. Simpson with the payments as made - signed by the corporation," meaning, presumably, the Christ Church corporation. Vestry thereupon approved a motion to prepare and to submit the requested papers to Bishop Barnwell, with Mr. Tillman and Mr. Fry handling the process. Mr. Fry, as Treasurer, duly reported to Vestry on May 7, 1950, that "the papers requested by the Bishop, in reference to the mortgage, had been executed and delivered."

The Church Bookshelf

Knit One, Purl a Prayer: A Spirituality of Knitting by Peggy Rosenthal. Paraclete Press, 2011

"Since we are created in the image of our Creator, it follows that we humans are created to create!" That is the thesis of this inspiring book, written by a self-professed skeptic of the prayer shawl ministry who herself became "blessed by the love knit into every stitch" of a shawl given to her at a difficult time. Rosenthal's insights speak not

only to knitters but to all creative people — woodworkers, cooks, painters, basketweavers — you name it. In fact, anyone who puts a hand out to wash the dishes, untangle the threads of a misunderstanding, or sweep away a pile of resentment will appreciate the central thesis of this book. Knitting is the author's metaphor for dealing with the problems of the day, for prayer, for inward peace. It is an act that requires focus and care, a quiet attention to creating something of use and yes, of beauty, no matter how simple the pattern. Men and women, desert fathers and mothers, veterans and housekeepers of all walks share their wisdom in this book; we hear from Episcopal priests and Sufi masters, from a 4th century b.c. Taoist and those grieving for dear ones. Threaded throughout are poems, prayers, and contemplative guidelines, all creatively knit together.
