

The Diocese of Georgia has guidelines for the intervening period between the time a rector leaves a parish and a new rector is called. That period calls for an interim rector to guide the congregation through a time of self-study that results in writing a parish profile document, forming a search committee, and conducting a national search for a new rector. The Transition Handbook is available online at http://gaepiscopal.org/docs/TransitionHandbook.pdf>.

After much consideration, the Vestry selected the search committee from our parishioners at a meeting on January 21. They are: Dr. Phyllis Holland, chair; Jeani Synyard, vestry liaison; Michael Black, Allan Dear, Mike Tanner, Helen Tucker, and Nikki Yarbrough.

The next step in the process is to examine where we are as a parish, where we have been and what God is calling us to do in the future. The information we gather is necessary to guide the search committee as well as to inform prospective candidates about our church. This Congregational Self-Study and

Assessment process will begin with two forums: the first at 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 31st; and the second at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, February 5th. Everyone in the parish is encouraged to attend one of these meetings and to participate in the discussions that will take place. The information gathered in these meetings and in future focus groups will be compiled into a Parish Profile that will be posted online as a part of the overall search process.

"The Search Committee will have organizational and clerical duties for the search, but the search process is truly a parish-wide activity, " said Phyllis Holland. "The forums scheduled for January 31 and February 5 are critical to developing an understanding of who we are as a parish and the skills we are seeking in a rector. Please make attendance and participation in one of these discussions a priority. The forums are the first step in producing a parish profile which is central to recruiting candidates for the position," she concluded.

A Prescription for Godly Living

A few years ago I had the opportunity to attend the Young Adult Summit in the Diocese of Atlanta. Their bishop at the time, Neil Alexander, was the keynote speaker, and he challenged the participants to read Romans 12 every day for the next six weeks. He spoke about how this passage from Paul's letter to the Romans had a large impact on his daily life. He told the participants this chapter had transformed his life. I decided to take the challenge.

What I found in Romans 12 was a prescription for Godly living. The chapter begins with the reminder that as we present our souls and bodies to God, we are making a holy, living, and acceptable sacrifice to God. In this chapter of Romans, Paul gives us guidelines on how we are to live as a community, on how to love each other and treat

our enemies, and how to live into our faith. Paul encourages us to not be overcome by this world but to be transformed by renewing our minds in Christ.

A sacrificial life is our spiritual worship. This entire chapter in Romans is a guide on how we are to live our lives. If you have not found a spiritual practice for the New Year, it's not too late, I suggest you take the challenge issued by Bishop Alexander. I am taking up this practice again and would love to hear what the Word of God is saying to you or how it is helping to transform your life.

New Year's Day at St. Marks

On January 1st Christ Church nature (and food) lovers, along with some families and friends, met at St. Marks National Wildlife Refuge for our 28th annual New Year's Day adventure. A caravan of 15 left the church parking lot at 8:30 a.m. but that group had expanded to 40 by noon. We walked along the Gulf coast near the lighthouse enjoying a variety of wintering ducks, shorebirds, and wading birds. We felt especially fortunate to find a friendly Tallahassee birdwatcher who shared his birding scope to show us rare visiting Razorbills, penguin-like Arctic birds rarely seen from shore and then seldom further south than New York.

At noon we gathered in the picnic area to pool the lunch items each person had brought. There were hot black-eyed peas for luck and wealth in 2013, sandwiches, meats, salads, cookies, cakes, chips, nuts, candies. Two bald eagles flew overhead as we picnicked, and a contingent of our little girls had the unforgettable experience of seeing an eagle drop its lunch prey near them. After lunch folks walked further into the refuge to spot the eagles' nest, wandered over to a nearby pond for birdwatching, or sat in the picnic area and visited.

By mid-afternoon, a slightly smaller group (many of them checking the score for the UGA/Nebraska game) headed to nearby Wakulla Springs for a boat ride along the Wakulla River, where they had close-up views of the manatees, anhingas, alligators, ducks, turtles, and wading birds who call Wakulla Springs home during the winter.

As evening drew nigh, 16 happy travelers drove a few miles to Spring Creek Restaurant for a delicious seafood meal and more good fellowship before the drive home.

Come join us next January 1st. It's a great way to start the New Year.

The Vineyard to Change Format

The Vineyard, monthly newsletter of Christ Episcopal Church, is going online in a web log, or "blog" format. The February and March editions will be published in both print and blog format. Those parishioners who do not have computer access can request a paper printout of the blog by calling Parish Administrator Kim Dudley at 242-5115. Those needing a paper copy can pick them up in the church entrance on the first Sunday of the month. The copies will be printouts of the blog.

The Vestry approved the request to change formats at the January 21st meeting after a request from the new communications committee. The committee members include: Julia Ariail, Julius Ariail, Michael Black, Eleanor Parten and Ann Kasun.

"There are about 12 good reasons for the change," said Julia Ariail. "The three top reasons are:

- the change will save the church approximately \$4,000 a year for printing and mailing costs;
- the change allows for more immediate news posting and editing rather than waiting until the next month;
- and the new format will allow multiple authors to post their articles from anywhere."

Communication is the most difficult thing in the world! In order to reach all the parishioners with schedules, news, and events, we must distribute the information in various formats hoping that one is the preference of everyone while keeping in mind the church budget and finances. Currently, our church gets its information in the Sunday Bulletin; *The Vineyard*, monthly newsletter; the church website; the church Facebook page; the Canterbury Club Facebook page; the church Twitter account; signs; the church photos on Picasa; announcements during the services; and emails from the church office.

We are also updating the weekly email from the church office as a weekly news bulletin with all the immediate news and service rotations listed.

The group meets for approximately an hour to talk about contemporary Christianity in a secular world. The group has a Facebook page which you can check out at: www.facebook.com/



Christ Church Looks Back

s related in the January Vineyard, on February 25, 1950, Christ Church paid \$7,555.56 to Mrs. Simpson, the holder of the \$15,000.00 mortgage on the church's property that financed construction of the Parish Hall. After reporting that development to the Vestry on March 4, 1950, Treasurer Noah Fry explained that subsequent payments had "so been arranged as to clean up the balance of the obligation [in] four years," meaning that the last payment would be in February 1954.

In the meeting of February 4, 1951, Mr. Fry reminded Vestry that the next mortgage payment of \$2,305.56 was due on February 25th "and that adequate funds were not yet on hand. . .." He warned that some church members would have to be asked to pay their pledges early and divulged that "some \$650.00 of 1950 pledges had not yet been received." Vestrymen agreed to attempt to collect 1950's outstanding pledges but conceded that, if their efforts failed, the unpaid pledges would have to be written off. The Minute Book offers no explanation of how Vestry actually raised the necessary funds, but Mr. Fry noted in the meeting of March 4, 1951, that Christ Church had paid \$2,305.56, "thereby accordingly reducing the principal and interest payments yet ahead...."

The year 1952 brought slightly less anxiety among vestrymen about paying the necessary installment to Mrs. Simpson. In the Vestry meeting on January 4, 1952, Jamie Carroll

broached the mortgage issue and sought suggestions about how Christ Church could discharge the entire balance when the yearly payment fell due on February 25. The ensuing discussion apparently yielded no substantial ideas, so Mr. Carroll's effort proved fruitless. In the next session, on February 3, Glenn Robinson offered a motion, seconded and approved, for payment of the required amount instead of the total balance. Mr. Fry, the Treasurer, pointed out that almost the full sum to be paid was on hand, and Marion Tucker offered "to advance any balance due on loan without interest." Thus, Mr. Fry was able to report at the March meeting that the installment had been paid, had reduced both the principal and interest of the mortgage, and a balance of \$4,176.21 remained to be dealt with in the next two years.

Vestrymen focused next upon the mortgage in their February 1, 1953, meeting, in which there was extended discussion. At that point, Christ Church was \$859.00 short of the total of \$4,176.21 "needed to clean up the mortgage, funds having been pledged, in excess of regular pledges, for the purpose of liquidating mortgage." Ultimately, an unidentified member moved that the balance of the mortgage be paid in full; the motion was seconded and approved, with Robert G. Macks, the Clerk, abstaining. In addition to requiring payment of the mortgage in full, the motion stated that Vestry should rely "on assistance from the various guilds for the balance necessary." After the motion had carried, vestryman Harry "Hap"

Davis made "some pertinent remarks" about publicizing the need for extra funds to eliminate the mortgage and claimed that "many families had not been solicited." Mr. Davis and Rufus B. Jones, Jr. thereupon were assigned to contact families that had not previously been reached. Just how the additional amount of \$859.00 really was raised is not clear from Vestry records. What is certain, however, is that Christ Church remitted the entire remainder of the mortgage to Mrs. Simpson on February 25, 1953. Then, on Sunday, March 1, 1953, the parish had a 4:00 p.m. service at which Bishop Middleton S. Barnwell finally consecrated the "new" church building, which had been in use for four years. One feature was "the presentation of cancelled mortgage to the Bishop at the service at 4 P.M. this date. Copy of the program entered into the Vestry notes."

Why, other than a natural aversion to debt, was Christ Church's Vestry in such a hurry to disencumber the parish of the Simpson mortgage? The short answer is that the church still needed additional Sunday School space and sought in 1952 to borrow \$16,000.00 from the American Church Building Fund Commission to construct classrooms while still paying the Simpson mortgage. After A.C.B.F.C. had already approved the loan, Bishop Barnwell made clear that he wanted the Vestry to turn down the offer and, as he put it, fortify Christ Church's financial situation "before attempting any further expansion." Vestry did as the bishop desired, but the critical necessity for classroom space still existed and so did the need to borrow more money.

It will be important for Tar+ to know how many people are planning to go this year, their skill level, and their interests. As of the printing of the *Vineyard*, eleven people have indicated they are going. We have people who have expressed interest in knitting, VBS and construction.

God Speaks in Many Tongues: Meditate with Joan Chittister Benetvision: 2013. https://www.monasteriesoftheheart.org/

This year, I again offer a book review in the form of a Lenten resolution – to read Joan Chittister's God Speaks in Many Tongues and to respond to its invitation to do more meditation than

reading. It promises to be a way of entering what Sister Joan, a Benedictine nun, calls the "monastery of the heart," a guide to living "a holy life, a good and happy life in the midst of our everyday activities." Available as a book and/or set of email meditations, God Speaks in Many Tongues offers selections from the world's wisdom traditions, along with daily meditations for the season of Lent. The first one, for Ash Wednesday, begins with a quotation from Hildegard of Bingen, the Benedictine Abbess whose musical, literary, and scientific writings have been universally praised. It is a meditation that ends, "You are encircled by the arms / Of the mystery of God." In the coming season of revision, reconsideration, and repentance, that promise is a comfort indeed.
